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

All footpaths are identifiable by being given two numbers on the footpath grid. One gives us the location (Longworth, Kingston Bagpuize, Southmoor) and the second relates to the path.

If the Parish Council widened the path, no. 268/12, down from the Village Shop to the flyover the A420, this would enable two people to walk side by side and when wheeling a pushchair it would not be necessary for one wheel to be in the dip, and the other up on the verge. Also it would give access for wheelchairs and generally make it an amenity for many more. That footpath looks to the West. Many evenings the sunset over the trees is beautiful and well worth an evening stroll.

Last chance broadband choice saloon

As most of you will have noticed there has been an increased Gigaclear presence in the village recently with eager young representatives knocking on doors and turning up at the village and school fetes.

Unless this happens in the next 4 weeks Gigaclear will move their focus away from our village to other villages and we will have lost a golden opportunity for Kingston Bagpuize and Southmoor.

So if you want the best choice of the most future proof services to be available to us and to future generations in the village now is the time to make sure of it by signing up for Gigaclear now. We know that enough people want Gigaclear to reach the target number but too many are thinking that waiting until it is available is the best way to go. Not so. That will mean it will never happen.

You can even postdate your sign up to take effect after the end of any existing contract you are in with BT or any other supplier so there is no reason to delay.

Let's make sure that in five years from now we are not complaining about our broadband like we currently do about our mobile phone service.

FEEL LIKE EATING OUT TONIGHT? No: 17 The Bell Inn, Standlake

Oh dear, oh dear, I have lived in this village for over forty years and never been to the Bell at Standlake before, and it will probably be another forty years before I go again.

Everything pointed to an enjoyable evening. Four of us arrived and were served the pre dinner drinks, shown to the table in a fine dining room furnished with Chesterfields in a warm and inviting ambience. So far so good.

When the waitress eventually arrived, a charming young lady, she advised us two of the starters were off. One of these had already been selected by the vegetarian bride, still these things happen, so we declined the starters. For the main course I chose the Braised Shank of Lamb with purple majesty mash, glazed turnip, carrot and red currant sauce. Alas, my meal came some four/five minutes after the other three so my companions sat there with their meals going cold, despite my protests they should start.

My knife was the wrong size, all small complaints perhaps but surely attention to detail is what matters when eating out in this type of establishment.

Now, the current trend for art on a plate, or 'nouvelle cuisine' as some smartie labelled it, is in full swing at the Bell. More artistic statement than food. The bride chose the sole, which strangely came as two small pieces when surely a feature of sole is to take the meat of one side and then turn the fish over for side B as it were. Two tiny potatoes cut in half decorated the platter.

My lamb was OK but that's about as far as I would go. Not particularly tender, not particularly tasty. The puddings were all priced at £6.50. Every item sounded good, as we were still peckish. Again two items were not available, this was getting monotonous. I went for the Passion Fruit Tiramisu. Delicious but such tiny portions and again decorated as if it was being put in for theTurner prize.

The evening was disappointing. The bride reckoned overall it was one of the worst meals she'd ever had. Harsh. Pity, everything had shaped up well. Food from local producers, pleasant staff, great décor but oh the size of the meals, ridiculous for a grown man.

The total damage was ± 106 for four with one bottle of wine, so not cheap, remember there were no starters and only two puds.

I read only recently in the national press that this trend for Michelin styled food is partly responsible for the obesity problem in the land. Not because of the sprigs of tarragon and gnat's whiskers that's served in the name of nourishment but because of the burger you have afterwards because you are still hungry. *Eton Lovett*.

THE KBS NEWS WINE LIST: WINES OF THE MONTH – AUGUST 2014



With the recent opening of our new "One Stop" village shop, we decided to try two of the wines they have on sale. They stock quite a good range of wines, ranging from £5 upwards. The wines we selected were produced by the Leopard's Leap Family Vineyards in the Western Cape area of South Africa. In addition to producing their excellent wines, Leopard's Leap is also a proud sponsor of the Cape Leopard Trust, which seeks to protect the magnificent Cape Mountain Leopard. This

endangered species make their homes in part of the Cape Winelands. Originally three leopards roaming the Cederberg Mountains were "adopted" by Leopard's Leap, and in 2011 a further three leopards were adopted under the same conservation initiative, and they were named Nala, Enzo and Sheeva. Further information can be found on their website leopard's-leap.com.

The Leopard's Leap white wine is a 2013 Sauvignon Blanc at £6.99. This wine is an elegant, well-structured example of this grape, created by gentle and reductive winemaking methods. Hints of lime and grapefruit flavours are delicately combined with a light green pepper mouth-feel, a zesty after taste completes the experience. All in all a superb white wine to enjoy as an aperitif or with a meal, it's great.

The Leopard's Leap red wine is a 2012 Cabernet Sauvignon/Merlot at £6.99. This velvety soft wine is made from 60% Cabernet Sauvignon and 40% Merlot, and in this classically styled wine, the flavours of blueberry, plum and cassis are prominent, enhanced by coffee and toffee undertones. This wine is full bodied, with a firm tannin structure, a wine to be savoured and enjoyed. So why not pop into the One Stop shop and try one or both of these excellent wines. 

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Ron's Green Gardening Tips for August

Many gardens contain a water feature. From a simple pond to a more elaborate structure, irrespective of size these water features are a pleasure and a vital haven for wildlife. They attract frogs and toads and if you are lucky great crested newts, plus visits from a rare dragonfly and the more common blue damselfly. Additionally they are a watering hole for wild birds when other sources of natural water have dried-up. In sultry weather which often occurs in August it is important to keep topping up the water as it evaporates and to keep the pond water oxygenated. A fountain or water feature will help but add fresh water by using a hose and spray. Cut off the old water lily leaves, and remove any leaves if they hide the flowers. Thin out any heavy growth of oxygenating plants and weeds but be careful not to discard water snails and other vital insect-larvae. In the rose border remove blooms as they fade. It is no longer necessary to apply fertiliser to roses after July as this will encourage late soft growth which will not mature before winter and these will attract aphids. If you grow your own vegetables remember to cut courgettes when they are small, about 10 to 12 cm (4 to 5 inches), for best flavour and to make sure you have a continuous crop until the end of the season. Beetroot should be ready to lift this month, along with the main crop potatoes and carrots. French and runner beans should be picked regularly, plus the tomatoes and sweet corn to name just a few. With all these crops coming to their peak of perfection make sure you don't waste any excesses. It's time to start stocking up the freezer, or consider making chutney, or pickles, jams or preserves from fruits, or that delicious Summer Pudding made with blackberries, blackcurrants, blueberries, autumn raspberries and strawberries, if there are any left? Remember to keep some of your best produce to enter into the Annual Village Show on Saturday 13th September. Early this month consider sowing Spring Cabbages 'Durham Early' is one of a number of varieties, but as a precaution against club root disease, sow seeds in ground that has not had manure added since last autumn. These plants are left to overwinter to enable them to produce small tender cabbages in early spring.

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NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The July meeting of the KBS Parish Council took place on Monday 7th July in the Village Hall. It was attended by 25 members of the public, plus Melinda Tilley, District and County Councillor, Mr Anton Nath, ORCC, Mr R Bend, Gigaclear, and Mr J. Ashton, West Waddy (a Development Co)

Public Participation: Residents commented on the arrogance of Taylor Wimpey, in lacking any consideration for the residents of Draycott Rd and for those attempting to access the school via Blandy Ave and Laurel Drive. The problems occur when Taylor Wimpey undertake deliveries and block the road or pathway. This is often in breach of the planning consents agreed under the traffic management plan. The enforcement officer of the Vale Planning Dept has failed to respond adequately to resident's complaints. The Clerk to contact the VWHDC to pursue effective action.

Mr R Bend, (Gigaclear) gave details of the "Fibre to the premises" commercial proposal, and advised that they are actively recruiting commitment to the service, in order to achieve the required numbers that will trigger the work, to bring the service to the Village.

Mr J Ashton (West Waddy) introduced two proposals for further housing in the village. The first is a scheme for up to 24 units on the Fallowfields Hotel site, combined with an extension to the hotel restaurant, and 10 further bedrooms. The second is for 19 units to the south of the existing Pye Development. Attention was drawn to the S106 agreement for the original Pye site which dedicates this area as informal recreation space and would be flouted by this proposal. The offer of access to this area for village recreation space contributed, in part, for limited opposition to the original proposal. Members and residents expressed their hostility to these proposals as contributing to a gross over development of the Village in a very few years (a situation common across the Vale villages, and the country as a whole triggered by this government's introduction of the NPPF).

Reference was made to the recent and on going problems with parts of the Village foul water systems. The clerk had received a response from Thames Water apologizing for the current disruption and of their efforts to resolve the situation as soon as possible. As yet no specific timescale for repair works and possible relining of some pipes. Further update is expected by 21st July.

Report from D&C Councillor: Mrs Tilley advised on a successful Ofsted inspection of the County's schools.

Planning: The road names for the Witney Rd site have been chosen as:- Chadelworth Way, Petypher Gardens, both after former rectors/vicars of Kingston Bagpuize in the 15th 16th century, and Poppy Close (in recognition of the display in the field this summer). For planning applications and decisions received, please refer to July minutes.

Donations: The Parish Council has agreed to fund half of the cost of grass cutting at the Millennium Green as an addition to our current contract.

Road safety: A response is yet to be received from OCC Highways as to our request for "Pedestrian Crossing" warning signs on the A420 By-pass, in particular at the Draycott Rd location. The extension of the pathway on the western side of Draycott Rd, has resulted in a narrowing of the road at the junction with Blandy Avenue. "School Run" drivers and local residents to be Aware!

Sports Field and Pavilion: Negotiations are nearing completion. It is hoped to have the Pavilion completed in time for the 2015 cricket season.

Land to South of Pye Development: If housing goes ahead on this site the opportunity for the remaining area will be limited. Only 8 households responded to the consultation via KBS News. Three see a need for facilities for teenagers, particularly wheeled sports, with a suggestion for a table tennis table (outdoor). The remainder support a wild flower meadow & or a community orchard and would be prepared to assist with planting and maintenance. Negotiations are in progress to acquire the land in the north east corner of the current site on completion of the housing.

Correspondence: VWHDC Community awards: names of three nominees forwarded.

Village Amenities: Defibrillator - The equipment is on order. A grant of £500 from our D&C Councillor's delegated fund has been approved.

Memorial Bench: A design has been selected for a bench to be erected in memory of Mateusz Kucinski. Mr. Young to select a site in the Large Recreation Ground, and agree an inscription.

Bus Shelter Latton Close: Further estimates are being sought for a rebuild and possible new design. Any local builders with an interest, please contact The Clerk.

Recreation Grounds: The damaged goalposts to be replaced. A Wickstead Sidewinder see-saw has been selected to replace the existing, dilapidated, equipment.

War Memorial: The Flags of the Nations' three armed services were flown on Armed Forces Day, 28th June last. This to be continued every year, in future. The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday, 1st September, at 7p.m. in the Village Hall. (No meeting in August) *Brian Forster, Chairman*



WORLD WAR I COMMEMORATION & EXHIBITION- ONE HUNDRED YEARS

Monday 4 August marks the 100th Anniversary of the date that Great Britain entered the First World War. The Bell Ringers of St Margaret of Antioch, Hinton Waldrist will be ringing the bells half-muffled in honour of the Fallen of WWI from Hinton, Longworth and Kingston Bagpuize - our villages suffered losses of three times the national average. Local historian Rob Belk will display his superb timeline banners which follow the individual stories of our Fallen against the backdrop of the events of the War. There will be compelling narrative extracts from the Oxford Diocesan Guild of Church Bell Ringers' annual reports for the years of the War which tell the ringers' story, and a page reproduced from the ringers' Roll of Honour in St Paul's Cathedral. Various WWI artefacts will also be on display, including some from descendants of the Fallen.

The Church will be open for 'prayer and contemplation' and to view the exhibition from 6.00pm to 9.00pm, with the bells being rung from 7.00 to 8.30pm. The sound of English church bells ringing half-muffled is extremely poignant and is a mark of great respect. It is a sound that would have been heard continuously throughout the country during the War years, so the sound of the bells half-muffled is a fitting complement to this exhibition. There is no service or formal ceremony. This 100-year commemoration is designed as a simple acknowledgement of the horrors that were to follow and as a tribute to those from our villages who made the ultimate sacrifice. They meet with their friends and also spend time with our adult volunteers, often challenging them to a game of pool. Longworth & District History Society

A visit to Eynsham with a guided tour by members of the Eynsham History Society, Pamela Richards and Martin Harris. We were told how Eynsham Abbey, a Benedictine Abbey, was founded in 1005 by Aethelmar an elder statesman at the court of Aethelred 'The Unready'. The first Abbot was Aelfric, a scholar and writer.

Village life would have revolved around the abbey. Although little of the abbey is left, it fell into ruin after the Reformation; it is possible to feel how central the buildings were to the village. Our walk started in the car park of the Catholic Church where a large information board about the abbey is placed. The information board is surrounded by a frame of the stones

from the abbey building. Around the village the information boards are set on stones from the old abbey. There was a major excavation of the abbey site and graveyard between 1989 and 1992. Throughout the village it is easy to see reused stone from the abbey visible in houses. The society visited Mapledurham House on the Thames near Reading. It has belonged to a single family since 1490. The present house was built in 1588. It has the only working mill on the Thames.

The History Society is keen to record the history of clubs and associations within the villages. Was there football in Longworth, and cricket in Hinton? Can you tell us please? Kathy Fletcher 820193

NOT A NUMBER - PART TWO A 2 MONTH IOURNEY ACROSS THE UNITED STATES BY BICYCLE. by Jeff Moore



The Road Less Travelled: The plan was to ride the first 2 weeks with vehicle support from my lovely wife Karen then set out across Texas on my own. I would be joined by a good friend for the ride from Phoenix up past the Grand Canyon and into Utah then would ride across Utah, Nevada and California on my own where I would meet up with Karen again and celebrate with a short holiday. I couldn't possibly condense the 62 days it took me to cross the USA into anything which would fit here so I will just give a flavour of the trip. at.....www.crazyguyonabike.com/doc/notanumber Florida, Alabama and Mississippi: The ride across Florida was a blast. 500 miles of decent roads, courteous drivers but pretty

mundane scenery of forest and farmland. I met up with the Great Ray Charles (at least his statue) in Greenville but someone had stolen his piano so I pushed on. It is difficult to see why 2 adjoining states should feel so utterly different but Alabama and Mississippi seemed to me to have little in common. Alabama was mostly high traffic, no shoulder roads and lots of aggressive drivers whereas Mississippi roads were wide, quiet and populated by attentive and courteous drivers. I rode through a small town called Wiggins and called into the Piggly Wiggly supermarket. The young lad on the checkout was very interested in the trip because as he put it 'There aint a whole lot of anything happens in Wiggins !!' I liked it a lot.

Louisiana: I could happily have skipped Louisiana with its feral dogs and largely dis-engaged people but I got on the vibe eventually. I didn't get bitten but was chased by literally dozens of dogs. Slower riders have more dog attacks. I found this to be a useful motivator to get across Louisiana as quickly as possible.

Texas: Texas is big. Very big. It took me 20 days to ride across the state and I loved it. It was a challenge, no question and if your range is only 40 miles a day then it isn't a place to visit on a bicycle because the services are sparse and you will put yourself in difficulty. Parts of the route are tough and very remote but if you have 90 miles in you then it is worth the effort just to enjoy the solitude. No services, no phone, no traffic.....just you and the road. 
our school off to its very best. We welcomed the report as it has given us all a very clear focus as to what we need to do better, and it celebrates what we already do well.
