SpeedWatch anyone?



We are all concerned about road safety in the village, especially with the recent increase in traffic. In last month's KBS News the Parish Council advised that volunteers are needed to help operate a speed camera on local roads. SpeedWatch can only operate in areas up to a 40 miles per hour speed limit. Community volunteers help Thames Valley Police officers to identify vehicles which break the speed limit. Registration numbers are entered onto a database which produces a letter from the Police informing the registered owner that their vehicle has been noted to have exceeded the speed limit and asking them not to do so in the future. If the same registration number is logged in another SpeedWatch anywhere within Thames Valley, the owner will receive another letter advising them that if they are caught a third time, the information will be passed onto Roads Policing, who may take further action.

No one has so far stepped forward so The News is repeating the request for volunteers to take part. A minimum of 6 persons are required and all must be at least 18 years of age. Full training will be given by the police and volunteers will be issued with all equipment needed.

My husband and I have lived in Southmoor for over 40 years. During that time we have seen many changes but are now very sorry to see TOO much change. We note the comments regarding a new Primary School to accommodate the latest request of housing towards Fyfield. Although John Blandy School is nearly full, they appear to have plenty of ground to build a few more classes or could double storey.

A far more useful school to build would be a new Secondary School for us and the surrounding villages as Matthew Arnold cannot take anymore of our students with their new housing developments.

Although we are part of the Faringdon Academy it is at full capacity and taking on more teachers but I am sure classes will be unacceptably high. They are also building around Faringdon itself.

Builders cannot keep building houses in villages and expect town Secondary Schools to take our students when the towns themselves are being pressured to build houses as well.

When was the last NEW Secondary School built I would be interested to know. In Australia they are building new Schools to take from 5 - 18 all on the same plot. Just a thought. *Name & Address supplied*

This is the reason why developers say they have no money to pay for infrastructure such as doctors surgeries, schools or anything else the surrounding areas need. Despite recent tragic events in Tunisia and economic uncertainty in the Eurozone, many of us are thinking of travelling overseas for some guaranteed summer sunshine.

If you are planning a family holiday abroad this summer please do double check that your passports and EHIC cards are up to date. The government has tightened up border controls and strengthened child protection. This is of course welcome, but it does mean that it is no longer possible to renew a child's passport at the last minute using the "same day appointment" system.

Please also remember that the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) is not a replacement for full travel insurance. It can be used in state-run hospitals in cases where immediate treatment is necessary across the EU. Do make sure you check out the details of the country you are visiting as it can be advisable to have a comprehensive plan as well. You do not need to pay for an EHIC card and information is available online at https://www.ehic.org.uk/ or by calling 0300 3301350.

I am also very pleased that overseas roaming charges – which make it expensive to use a mobile phone when abroad – will be abolished in two years' time in Europe. This welcome change will be preceded by a 14 month interim period in which companies can still add surcharges but at a reduced rate. It is estimated that roaming within the EU will be 75% cheaper during the interim period.




beanbags to use in the garden, along with some UV balls and a selection of CD's featuring music from around the world.

Having heard a sterling report on this brand new restaurant, we thought we would give it a go, as it were, as we found ourselves in Wantage this particular evening. A friend had reported the rib-eye steak as the best he had ever eaten, so in we ventured. Six people to be seated? No problem at all. Décor great, ambience excellent, the scene was set for an excellent dining experience. Unfortunately, the excellent experience ended there and the rest of the evening

could have been a sketch from Monty Python.

The drinks order was taken and finally arrived with one drink too many. Eventually, and I do mean eventually, the waitress turned up for the food order. At this point I should point out the place was only half full, so what it must be like when it's really busy must be the stuff of culinary nightmares.

First of all there was no rib-eye steak or even sirloin available. Nil points so far.

Re-jigging the order, off went the said waitress and that was the last we saw of her for fifty minutes I reckon. After being chased, the lady I took to be the manager informed me the food was just coming.

The subject this month for the Village Wine Circle was Alsace Wine and a very good tasting it turned out to be, not surprisingly everyone produced a bottle of white

wine.

The bottle we are reviewing is

Gentil Hugel 2012, it is a blend of several varieties and a perfect introduction to Alsace wines and is suited to a great number of occasions, made up predominantly of Sylvaner and Pinot Blanc together with Riesling and Pinot Gris.

The wine is a bright pale green colour, fresh and lively and clings quite tightly to the glass. It's approachable easy to drink style, is perfect on its own but equally good with fish or seafood. The wine came from the Oxford Wine Company priced at $\pounds 12.99$.

Because the White wine was quite expensive we choose the Red from Marks and Spencer, it's their Australian Shiraz priced at \pounds 5.25 a bottle.

Perhaps not one of our better moments, its drinkable but we won't be running back for more but if Shiraz is your thing don't let us put you off.

In our opinion far better to call in to Lidl's and pick up their Rioja 2009 Cepa Lebrel Reserva at \pounds 5.49 reviewed in our June column.

Longworth & District History Society

The trip on Thursday 16th July was described as 'A Kingston Bagpuize and Southmoor Countryside Experience' by our guide Peter Keene. He had devised a guided walk starting and ending at the gates of



Kingston Bagpuize House. More than 30 members and friends of the History Society met for the evening.

There were 22 points of interest to note as we walked the 3 miles. Passing the first school endowed by John Blandy in 1736 founded to " teach local boys the art of navigation and rules of mathematics". We walked down Rectory Lane passing the South Lodge of Kingston House and looked at the decorative arches over the windows of yellow and dark blue flared bricks, and the Stonesfield slate roof, both features reflecting on the quality of the estate. Further down Rectory Lane is the old rectory. Little Pelham, a stately Georgian house built for the rector Richard Blechinden in 1723.

Remnants of World War II can be found in the grass airfield. Initially used for training, but later upgraded in 1944 when the invasion plans were made the airfield became redundant after the Normandy landings and was returned to agriculture in late 1944.

We walked on through Swannybrook Farm, past the wartime Nissen huts which are now used for small business units. We joined the road which led us on to the Hanney Road. We walked in single file to Southmoor as the cars whizzed by. We passed where the hop fields had been for about 80 years.

The walk continued to Town Pond Lane and followed the foot path to Norwood Avenue and on to the church. An enjoyable summer evening.

The Walk booklet can be obtained from The History Society cost £1.00, for anyone wishing to walk this route themselves. Next trip for the society is in September when we visit The Merchant House in Marlborough. *Peter Keene and Kathy Fletcher* 820193.

NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The July meeting of the KBS Parish Council took place on Monday 6th July in the Village Hall, together with 8 members of the Public, and District Councillor, Mr Eric Batts.

Apologies received from County Councillor, Mrs M Tilley.

The meeting opened with the presentation of a gift, by the Chairman, on behalf of the members of the council of 2011/2015 and years prior, to the retiring Clerk, John Melling, to mark his 15 years of service to the community. The incoming Clerk, Mr David Groves, was then introduced, and his appointment as Responsible Finance Officer / Proper Officer took place. Please Note: Email Address for communications to the Parish Council Clerk is kingstonbagpuizesouthmoorpc@gmail.com

Public Participation: Speeding: The proposal for the purchase of a speed camera for use in the villages of Neighbourhood Action Groups, N.A.G 2 (East of Faringdon) was discussed. That afternoon an official police speed check had taken place at Spring Hill, where a number of offenders were clocked. Subsequently, the B.B.C programme, "Country File" (19thJuly) featured an article on Village Speeding Concerns, which highlighted Volunteer Manned Speed Camera, whereby offenders are sent Warning Letters only, which is what the current proposals attempt to achieve.

Road Safety: The general Melee (poor parking and congestion) around the shops at Cherry Tree Close was highlighted. The chair has drawn attention to the situation with the N.A.G. and police.

Report from District Councillor: Eric Batts, advised that when considering planning applications, the VOWHDC design guide should be referred to. The Draft Local Plan is due to be submitted to the appointed inspector between 22nd. Sept 2015 and 1st October 2015.

Village Hall: New Footpath / Retaining wall and Feature Entrance. As a result of the new pavement constructed by Taylor Wimpey (TW) to service their Southmoor Grange development, they had offered to build a retaining wall and feature entrance, this was being delayed by O.C.C. highways concerns over property and highways boundaries. A meeting between TW reps, O.C.C. Highways, Chair of The Village Hall Committee and Parish Council Chair, resolved the issue in that the boundary of the Village Hall was recognised as the western edge of the new pavement, and work could proceed to this boundary. It is hoped work will commence shortly.

Footpath Draycott Rd To Beggars Lane: Subsequent to the above meeting, a survey meeting was carried out on work to the footpath and a number of issues were highlighted, work to the path surface has yet to be completed, and the overgrown vegetation needs to be cut back; promises were received that this work would be completed in two weeks, hopefully, by the end of July! Readers may have noticed a B.B.C. South programme that highlighted over grown Footpaths in Southmoor, which indicated that it is O.C.C. Highways DUTY to keep clear.? The County Councillor's attention has been drawn to this issue.

Land to be purchased under S106 agreements: The New Tennis Courts planning application has been submitted. The transfer of land from TW to the P.C. is being progressed.

O.C.C. Revision of subsidised bus services and Dial-a-Ride service: The main issues are the withdrawal of bus subsidies altogether, reduced funding to subsidised bus services, adopting principle of prioritising where possible, services most likely to be used by the elderly, and or disabled, and ending direct funding of the Dial A ride Service. Most At Risk are routes 63 and X15.

Encourage community transport groups across the county to deliver a replacement service? Who Pays? Further local taxes / garaging, insurance, Fuel etc.+ the drivers reqd.

Village Amenities: Funds are available from O.C.C./ VWH to provide two new bus shelters. Possible locations suggested, are 1) opposite School Lane, to serve both Faringdon bound and Oxford bound as there is insufficient space on the School Lane side 2) Opposite Post Office, Oxford Bound. Further suggestions invited.

War Memorial: For this year's Remembrance Day Parade, invitations to 3 Regt. R.L.C. RAF contingent from Brize Norton, VOWH Rep. and County Rep.

Their efforts with weeding and watering were rewarded later when they harvested radishes, lettuce, broad beans, carrots and onions from the raised vegetable bed. The promising strawberries and raspberries in the WI fruit

garden looked too tempting and these mostly disappeared mysteriously before they were harvested 'could it have been the hungry Blackbirds'? There was lots of rhubarb to share and before the summer break the few early potatoes were cooked at school and eaten. The children said they were yummy. Whilst the children are away on holiday they will not have forgotten their recent planting, the runner beans, onions, baby pumpkins and

hopefully broccoli will have grown along with the apple and pears and the tallest sunflower competition to be judged in September. Are you aware the village hall provides facilities for badminton? It costs just ± 10.50 per hour to hire the court for four players. That's good value for an hours workout. Make up a team and that's real value.

Residents, including those new to the village can pick up a free brochure which includes details about the hall and its facilities.

The Village Hall management team are optimistic that by the end of the summer the long awaited new boundary treatment with a log retaining wall between the footpath and the copse along Draycott Road will have been completed following lengthy discussions with OCC Highways, the Parish Council and Taylor Wimpey. Improvements will also include the building of a Dry Stone Wall to form a new entrance to the hall. Taylor Wimpey has agreed to carry out this as part of a local neighbourhood scheme for the area.

In June the Village Hall were finally able to submit their Application for the Allocation or Release of funds to the Vale of White Horse District Council under Section 106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990. The act allows contributions to be sought from developers in the village towards the costs of providing community and social infrastructure and/or improvements. The funds applied for by the Village Hall will go towards upgrading the windows and doors plus improved disabled access and added hall security. The application has been supported by letters to the District Council from groups who regularly use the premises. We keep our 'fingers crossed' for a favoured outcome to our application later this year.

There have been recent reported instances that owners are exercising their dogs around the Village Hall. This is despite the notices that DOGS ARE NOT ALLOWED. The area is regularly used by children attending clubs and private events, and there are fears that accidents may occur. Please do not take your dog onto any part of the Village Hall property and grounds. *Ron Green*

Youth Matters

Scott Thomson writes:



While reading last month's KBS news, an article caught my eye. This article summarised the events of the 'consultation' meeting, which is an ironic name. It makes it sound like we're the ones in charge. I didn't go personally, but I have been

informed 750 houses are planned, which is really nothing new, but what interested me was the other proposals the developers planned. During the course of this article I will be examining these and looking at their implications for the village youth.

Firstly is the inclusion of a new school in the list of infrastructure developments. This would be enormously beneficial, as since the village is expanding, John Blandy, as good as it is, cannot contain the flood of young children wishing to join the school, especially as a lot of young families are moving into the recent constructions of our village. As great as this is for the village infrastructure, sourcing new teachers may be difficult, but the benefits far outweigh the obstacles the school may have to face.

Another important addition to the village will be a new bypass that will link the A420 and the A415 and will include two new roundabouts. This will do a great job of relieving some of the traffic that gets bottlenecked around the Hind's Head, making crossing the A415 much easier. This will be great for people wanting to walk from the houses north of the A415, including the new developments to reach other areas of the village such as the village hall or the bus stops.

The final aspect of the 'consultation event' I want to talk about is the promise of shopping facilities in one of the new developments. This will be especially beneficial for anyone living on the new estates, as a shop will be only a quick walk away, including anyone living in the countryside to the east of the village. Also, new shops could mean less traffic to Onestop, lessening the burden on the roads, especially if shops other than grocery stores opened up. I think that despite the increase in houses, this vital infrastructure will hugely benefit the village.



Mark Potts' **Kitchen Talk**

Were really lucky at the hotel to get a lot of produce from our farm and gardens. This last

few weeks has seen a lot of produce from the garden. We have been making pickles chutneys and preserves with gooseberries red currants blackcurrants raspberries and Logan berries. Something I tried for the first time this year was elderflower cordial. It's a lovely flavour which we will use for sorbets, ice creams and in cakes. This is the recipe I used which worked really well. The fresh flowers are best gathered when the tiny buds are just starting to open.

This makes around 2 litres: around 30 elderflower heads; zest of 3 lemons and 1 orange; 150 ml lemon juice; Ikg sugar I heaped teaspoon citric acid. Wash all the elderflower heads. Put in a bowl with the zests. Bring 1.5 litres of water to the boil and pour over the elderflower and leave overnight to infuse. Strain this through muslin into a saucepan add all the other ingredients. Heat gently to dissolve the sugar then bring to the simmer and cook for a few minutes. Store in sterilised containers. This is a great unique flavour with many uses. A taste of summer!



•76% of the children in Reception achieved a Good Level of Development. Last year the National standard was 60% so we are confident we have surpassed the National Average for the second year running

 \cdot 88% of our Year I children passed the Phonics Screening Check. Last year the National standard was 74% so we are confident that we have surpassed the National Average for the 3rd year running.

· 100% of our Year 2 children achieved Level 2 or above in Reading, Writing and Maths. This is hugely significant as not only will we have surpassed National Averages in each of these subjects, but these results signal the highest achievement our school has had for at least 5 years.

 \cdot We are also very pleased to share that a high percentage of our Year 2 children achieved Level 3 this year; 30% in Reading, 37% in Writing and 44% in Maths. It is wonderful to see our children being stretched and challenged to achieve this higher Level of attainment

 \cdot We have had the best Year 6 SAT results the school has seen over the last 5 years. 85% of the children achieved a Level 4 in Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar, 95% in Reading, 95% in Maths and 100% in Writing. We will be significantly above the National Average in all subjects which is fantastic.

•We also had a large percentage of Year 6 children achieving the higher Level 5; 70% in Reading, 64% in Writing, 60% in Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar and 20% in Maths.

These results are outstanding, and are demonstrative of the hard work and commitment our school partnership of pupils, parents and staff have shown this year. It is only through this successful partnership that our children are able to achieve such fantastic results.

To enable us to achieve such high quality results we have further embedded our Values culture this year. Consequently we have seen a marked difference in the overall 'behaviour for learning' our children display in lessons, around school and in their commitment to carrying out homework tasks. As well as Values impacting on our academic achievement, we have also grown very responsible children who have taken on extra roles this year such as Play Leaders and Lunchtime Monitors. These two roles have been hugely successful in helping us achieve the very best lunchtimes at school. This is such a key part of the day - a happy lunchtime creates happy children who are in the best place to access their learning and have fun!

I am aware that as we look forward to the next academic year some of you may be concerned as to how the school will cope with the growth of the village, as documented almost monthly in the KBS News. Contrary to what may be perceived, we are currently operating under capacity with our smallest class being made up of just 19 children. We are proud of how well our new families have settled into our fabulous school, and look forward to more children joining us! We are working closely with the Academy and the County Council to plan for expansion to enable us to provide more school places. These plans are really coming on and will be published soon.

All that is left is to say another WELL DONE to all of the children for their hard work and a THANK YOU to their families and our staff that we have supporting them. I hope all of our John Blandy families have a fantastic summer and I look forward to seeing you all on the 3rd of September!
