In Memory of the Fallen

Again fortune favoured the brave and the sun shone down on the new Memorial Crescent on Remembrance Sunday. A crowd of several hundred from the village attended the short service held by the Rev. David Pickering to mark the falling of service personnel not only from the community

but those from afar who lost their lives locally whilst in training. The war dead from recent conflicts are also commemorated on the memorial stones, each stone receiving a wreath of poppies laid by representatives of the armed forces and village associations, including the Parish Council.

Just before II o'clock, the bugler played the Last Post, the flags and standards were lowered and the two-minute silence observed. Now the memorial is complete with the sparkling white poles flying the Union flag beside the banners of Canada and the USA, it is a superbly fitting tribute to the men and women who died fighting for our freedom, and one of which our village should be very proud. Our thanks go again to the team that made the idea bear fruit and provide us with such a monument.

After the final prayer the crowd was lead by Stan Webb and Jan Carlisle in the hymn 'Abide with Me', a fitting end to such a perfect tribute to our War dead. *Lance Bassett*

Every Autumn the District Council holds a 'Town and Parish Forum' at which councillors from throughout the Vale are informed of current strategies and two-way discussions take place with officers relating to planning, policing, health and other topics of general interest. This year a new word was introduced to Local Government Speak – not new in the same way a 'siloing' or 'Scopeing', but a new meaning for an old word..... 'Saturation.'

I live in Stone House Close K.B. I was so annoyed at the report in KBS news, that our exchange has no plans to be updated that I e-mailed Ed Vaizey. To the credit of his office, I was contacted almost immediately by Bill Murphy who said he was the MD at BT responsible for the latest deal with OCC. He said he would check the speed on my line. I estimate this to be about 3mbps. BT have told me I should be getting 5mbps but of course this drops the further you are away from the exchange. Last week during the half-term holiday, speeds in the afternoon were abysmal. A further e-mail from Bill Murphy states that Peter Cowen the BT regional manager for Oxfordshire would be willing to meet with our community together with OCC to discuss the matter. I notice that the map on The OpenReach website shows the exchange in Longworth village. I thought that it was next to the Waggon & Horses pub, part of which used to be in Longworth! Have the powers that be looked at the map and decided that Longworth is a sparsely populated rural village and overlooked the large population south of the A420? I pointed out to Mr Vaizey that the village will be increased by I/3rd and that will put a further strain on the current broadband lines. Is there any mileage in taking this matter further, bearing in mind what happened with the housing applications!

I am sure that house prices will be affected in the long term if decent broadband is unavailable. Ken Ritchie

We hear that there is a class-act rumpus running in UK over the latest +/- 10% energy price hikes - so I have compared our energy bills in France with those at TSC. I took the latest bills this summer in each case - so the UK prices are before the latest price increases (no news of price increases in France, as yet). Both UK and France have the same 5% VAT on energy consumption.

The result is that at the current exchange rate, gas prices per kWh are +/- the same in both locations - but the UK electricity price per kWH is nearly 80% higher than the price in France. Our supplier in France is EDF and our supplier in UK is SSE - but since all the supposedly competing companies charge about the same, the comparison is valid.

It's interesting that nearly 80% of France's electricity is generated by nuclear - whereas most of UK's electricity is generated by carbon sources - so 'blame' for the 80% higher electricity prices in UK can possibly be laid at the door of the anti-nuclear lobby and their fellow-travelling politicians. *Rob Belk*

We were sorry to learn of the death of Robert Dyer at the beginning of September. Robert had been a faithful deliverer of the News at the Kingston end of the village for a long time until ill-health intervened earlier this year. We knew that he was a keen sailor and had been Mayor of Faringdon, but it was at his funeral that many heard for the first time what an interesting and influential life he had led. A graduate of Cambridge University, he later became one of the Directors at EMI at the time when there was a lot of money to be made from the success of the Beatles. He played an important role in the 1970s in bringing the newly invented brain and body Scanners to market - on which so many of us now rely.

FEEL LIKE EATING OUT TONIGHT? No: 10 The White Hart, Fyfield

This venue has been one of my favourite eateries for a while now. It's local, it's easy to park, the staff are friendly, the food is good and the atmosphere is warm.

Four of us dined tonight, the table booked two days earlier. There were some empty tables, which is strange because I was told when booking they were busy and pushed back my attempted reservation time, but hey ho.

After a drink at the bar we were shown our table and in short order supplied a complimentary dish of balsamic vinegar and olive oil with homemade bread-very continental and a nice touch.

Having all decided we wouldn't have a starter but go for a pud instead, I chose the slow-roasted belly of Kelmscott Pork. The meal came in good time and not only looked fabulous, decorated with a single thin finger of crackling, but tasted superb. Supported by celeriac puree, cider jus and apples and carrots from the White Hart garden. The pork was so tender it melted in your mouth, a triumph of the culinary art.

The bride and friends had the beer battered haddock, proper chips with mushy peas tasted as good as it looked apparently.

The pudding menu offered a host of temptations but I succumbed once again to my favourite sticky toffee pudding with butterscotch sauce and ice cream.

Waitress Louise looked after us magnificently and came up trumps supplying the extra butterscotch sauce I requested. In the words of Oscar Wilde, I can resist anything except temptation.

I have to say every mouthful was a treat and when the inevitable bill arrived, the meal, including the bar drinks, two course meal for four and a rather nice bottle of wine clocked in at just £62 per couple. Excellent value for this standard of cuisine. I shall start looking forward to my next visit today. Eton Lovett.

KBS Christmas Wine List

Our subject this month is "Wines for Christmas", and for this we visited The Oxford Wine Company on the Botley Road, Oxford (situated just before PC World on the right hand side). The Manager, Lee Isaacs, was extremely helpful, and with his assistance chose the following wines:

For a Christmas Morning aperitif, we selected a PassaParola Prosecco from Italy, priced at £9.99.

Prosecco is the name of the grape that is used and many of the best examples are 100% Prosecco. It has a slightly yeasty nose, with a touch of spring flowers and apple skin fruit. The palate has flavours of nectarines with touches of green herbs, some real zest and a hint of peach. This is a wine which will suit all tastes, not too dry and not too sweet, ideal for Christmas Morning.

The white wine is a Falerio 2011 priced at £8.40, from a little known enclave of The Marche, in the centre of Italy. This wine, which includes the rare grape varieties of Passerina and Pecorino, is delightfully lemon oil and fennel scented, and is crisp, dry, intriguing and compelling. It should be served lightly chilled, not too cold, to retain its delicate flavours, and would complement a fish starter and also turkey should white wine be preferred. The red wine is Los Haroldos Malbec 2012 from Argentina, priced at £8.49. Los Horoldos is one of the most important wineries in the Famillia Falasco stable, a company started in 1939. Having the bright red fruit of a good Malbec, this wine is medium bodied and well balanced. Smokey tannins support raspberry, plum and cassis flavours alongside a healthy dose of aromatic wood and spice. This wine will accompany the turkey and cheese courses extremely well.

Returning home after 62 years!



Elsa Green recently returned to visit her home of St Helena in the South Atlantic. Elsa who has lived in Sandy Lane Southmoor for 53 years, left her remote island of St Helena at the young age of 15 years and travelled alone to England to join her mother and sister then living in Northern Ireland.

Returning to St Helena for the first time since leaving 62 years ago brought back many past memories. Re-visiting her old family home for example, unoccupied since 1974 and her old school now a village community centre. A live interview on the only local radio 'Saint Helena FM' brought Elsa in contact with some of her school

friends and meetings with many relatives and friends still living on the island. St Helena is one of the remotest places left on the planet situated between Africa and South America deep in the South Atlantic ocean with no airport, no mobile phone service it can only be reached by sea from Cape Town, a 5 day voyage, or from its sister island of Ascension two days sailing away. The Royal Mail Ship RMS St Helena is the only ship serving the island and is literally the island's lifeline; it carries 128 passengers and 1500 tonnes of cargo.

This tiny island measures only 9 miles by 7 miles was discovered by the Portuguese in 1502 and in 1658 the English made claim to the island and it has been an overseas colony ever since. St Helena is best known as the final home of Napoleon; he lived in exile on the island and died at Longwood House now a museum to his memory. Also the island boasts to have the oldest living tortoise Jonathan, said to be over 200 years old and lives in the grounds of Plantation House which so happens to be the home of the current Governor of St Helena. NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL



The November meeting of the KBS Parish Council was held on Monday 4th November Hall, together with District and County Councillor, Melinda Tilley, and three members of the public.

in the Village

Public Participation. A resident of Springhill noted that current activities on Springhill Farm are acceptable to neighbours. Two residents had learnt that Taylor Wimpey plan to start work on their development towards the end of the month, earlier than initially indicated to the Council. The situation regarding the landscape scheme (and noise attenuation measures) has also been considered as inappropriate.

Report from District and County Councillor. Councillor M. Tilley reported that OCC have just launched the revised consultation on Home to School Transport, and emphasised that all responses will be carefully evaluated. Parents of affected children and of those soon to leave Primary school are urged to respond most vigoursly against the proposals, and highlight the current and historical situation within this area, now further exacerbated by the fact that it is possible that children now attending John Blandy Primary, find themselves at Larkmead School in Abingdon not by choice. The Parish Council will continue to vigorously oppose the proposals.

As regards Childrens' centres, in response to a question from the Chair, the Cllr advised that a small cross party group had been set up within OCC to examine all Childrens' centres within Oxfordshire, and what alternatives to current arrangements may be appropriate, in each case. (This as a result of a current cost saving proposal by OCC to close some 95% of existing centres!)

Matters Arising: Emergency Planning. The Chairman had attended a recent meeting at the Vale offices, run by OCC and The Vale at which all councils were encouraged to create an Emergency Plan in order to improve responses to Major events that might occur both within the Village, and and the wider vicinity. (eg A major road incident on the A420). Close liaison with the Village Hall Management Committee will be required as a plan may be developed. A booklet published by OCC will be delivered to all households shortly.

Foul Water Blockages. There have been recent instances of sewage blockages in and around the Blandy Avenue area. On investigation, Thames Water had advised that they were due to deposits of fabric material/rags etc together with fat deposits. Residents are urged to think about what they might be depositing in an already "Close to capacity" system and the potential consequences.

Planning. The names of Wild flowers identified in the ecology report, will be used to name the Roads on the Draycott Rd. Development.

An earlier decision to object to P13/V1797/Ful. Was reviewed in the light of a letter from the applicants agent. Members resolved that the earlier objection should stand.

A number of members requested that an earlier decision not to undertake a Neighbourhood Plan (based on Potential Cost) should be reviewed once updated information on costs and benefits is obtained.

A request that a meeting with OCC Rights of Way Officer be held to discuss improvements in the Public Footpath network was agreed in view of opportunities presented by on-going development.

Mr. Carter will be approached to discuss the future use and management of his land to the South of the Pye Development. For applications and decisions, please refer to November Minutes.

Village amenities. New/replacement improved safety surfacing for the bank of swings is still awaited. The cradle swings have had components removed. Some bolts missing on tube slide of Jubilee Fort.

Burial Ground. Ivy threatening the Church Yard Wall has been removed.

War Memorial. A successful and moving Remembrance Day service was conducted by the Rev D. Pickering, attended by some 200 people, and notably the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Oxfordshire, Mrs Elizabeth Paris, who attended as HM the Queens' Representative. Together with a large young peoples' contingent of Scouts, Guides, Cubs and Brownies. Wreaths were laid on behalf of HM the Queen, Serving members of the Armed Forces, The Parish Council, The Scouts and Guides and Cubs and Brownies, and a grateful civilian. Flags of the three nations who flew from Kingston Bagpuize Airfield, during the Second World War, were also flown.

The 'OXFORDSHIRE' Blitz

As somone with more than a passing interest in WW2, I did some research into how the London Blitz had extended west and north, plus were there any local targets the German Luftwaffe would consider worthwhile given it would leave many enemy aircraft short of fuel.

Were there any targets in Oxfordshire? It appears our county did in fact endure high level bombing in the early part of the war, and Hitler's much vaunted terror weapon the V1 and other heavy ordnance attacked the aerodrome at Drayton St. Leonard. There is no record of attacks by the V2 rockets.

Closer to home I have listed here some of the targets round us that were bombed by the Luftwaffe.

Brize Norton on the 16th August 1940 and the 10th November 1941.

Bampton 30th October 1940 and 9th March 1941

Broughton Pogg 29th September 1940

Carterton 14th October 1940

Cote 20th November 1940

Minster Lovell 21st October 1940

Minster Lovell (400kg Phosphor) 12th March 1941

Stanton Harcourt 16th August 1940, 3rd October 1940,, 5th May 1941.

Stanton Harcourt was also machine gunned on one particular raid.

Shilton (400kg Phosphor) 5th September 1941

Witney 22nd November 1940.

Raids like these occured almost everywhere stretching from Claydon to Kelmscott. Many of these are areas that appear to have no military use. Did the War Department use Oxfordshire as a quiet hiding place for hiding munitions or was it merely stray bombardment by German pilots reducing weight in order to return to France without ditching in the unforgiving Channel? *Latham Clarke*.



There have been recent reports of a carpet company cold calling elderly and vulnerable residents in the Thames Valley area.

Since the beginning of November, Oxford Trading Standards have received 6 complaints from elderly residents who have been cold called by telephone by a carpet company who state they are in the area and offering to clean carpets for £19.99. Workers come and clean the carpet, but then issue a bill for anything between £300-700 and insist that this cost is paid. Please be aware of these cold calls and refuse the 'service' which they offer.

If you have received a phone call recently from a carpet company offering to clean your carpet for £19.99, or know of anyone who has (if possible check with any elderly neighbours) then please contact the Doorstep Crime Team at Oxfordshire Trading Standards on 0845 051 0845 (option 2).

A Villager's View: KBS 14+ Drop In

There has been a significant amount of negative press surrounding the village youth in the KBS News in recent months so I thought I'd go and meet a few in their natural habitat in order to check them out.

I paid a visit to the KBS 14+ Drop In on Friday evening. It's open for Yr 9s up (to 18yrs) every Friday 7.30-9.30pm in the Methodist Chapel opposite the Crossroads Garage – unfortunately I could only go as a visitor because I'm far too old to join.

The place was buzzing! Loud music was playing from a 'proper' DJ set-up, courtesy of Sammy and Ben (they generously bring in their own gear each week). The pool and table tennis tables were in use and a competition was in full swing on the Wii, showing on the big flat screen of the new TV. It was packed. There were students from Faringdon Community College, Matthew Arnold and other local schools. Ben told me it's grown massively in the last year.

In the kitchen toasted sarnies were on the go and the tuck shop was well stocked and ready for the onslaught. The young people were friendly, well mannered, very articulate and keen to share their opinions about the KBS 14+. Louisa told me that the volunteer adults who help out are "all nice, caring and ready to have a laugh". Kate said they're the type of people you can "go to if you need help ... like a really good friend". There are always three adult volunteers present all interviewed and DBS checked. There are 12 volunteers in all and approximately 40 young people on the books.

More volunteers are needed (18yrs+) as is a chairperson and a minute's secretary for the committee (meets once a term). If you feel able to help out please drop Delyth an email on delythhg@ymail.com

The KBS 14+ Drop In opened 15 January 2010 for young people in Year 9 and above. It's run by volunteers and has been faithfully led by amazing Delyth and her committee. I'm not exaggerating when I say amazing: in the first six months there were very few young people who came along – but Delyth was determined to keep going and faithfully opened it every Friday evening. Numbers slowly began to pick up and her vision has been accomplished. It's now bursting at the seams.

Jack told me that it's a "good place to be" as it "keeps us off the streets". He said that Fridays are best because he's "now allowed out later because there's somewhere to go" and it's a great way of meeting others. I asked a group of them what they thought about negative perceptions of teenagers; Hannah commented that "adults assume we're all bad. They don't see the real you and assume from other peoples' bad behaviour that we're all the same". Vanessa quickly followed this up - "It's not true! We're lovely people". And they are.

There are some great trips out too: bowling, Laser Quest, workshops (e.g. boxing and dodge ball), midnight iceskating; the list goes on. And to help fund all of this the proactive teenagers organised a sponsored walk which raised nearly £200 for the club.

It's not entirely funded by the teenagers though. Some local people kindly make donations. Funds also come from St John the Baptist church, our Parish Council and the County Council; this has bought a great deal of equipment for the group including the TV, Wii and table tennis table.

There are plans for a party to celebrate four years of KBS 14+ Drop In on Friday 24 January, 7.30-9.30pm. It will be an open session so villagers, supporters/funders, past and present volunteers and parents are all welcome to pop in and see it in action. Do go – I recommend it! Jenny Weaving
