# Final score: Vale Planners I, Democracy 0.

You will see in the Parish Council News (page 16) that Outline Planning Permission was granted to MacTaggart & Mickel to build up to 280 houses on the land between the Old Oxford Road (opposite the Millennium Green / Bowls Club) across to the A415. The Vale Planning Officials recommended approval. At the meeting the Parish Council, Objectors and the Developer are each allowed 3 minutes to explain their views on the proposals.

The Parish Clerk on behalf of the Parish Council questioned a number of matters including the dangerous access on to the A420, excessive density of the houses, inadequate parking facilities, lack of funds for village amenities, including a sizeable contribution towards Scout and youth facilities and the lack of a doctors surgery. The planning officials had stated that there was "no justification" for these last two items. In addition the Clerk questioned why, within the Section 106 (S106) proposals there was £285,000 for leisure facilities in Wantage when there were no bus services from the village to enable residents to get there. The Clerk also questioned why the S106 proposals included £1,179,029 for expansion of Matthew Arnold School when there are no FREE transport facilities to that school for new students from the village. The Clerk also raised the matter of a signalised crossing of the A415 which had been included in the David Wilson development but had not been built. At a later stage one of the officials stated that although the money to provide this was included, the Highways authority had the final decision and if they, the Highways Authority, decided against a signalised crossing the VOWHDC could do nothing more. It could not be guaranteed.

Although we knew in our hearts that we were probably wasting our breath a few of us objectors attended the meeting and I spoke to the committee. I said that in my view there were many objectors in the village but most had not formally done so as they believed the District Council took no notice and simply agreed to whatever developers applied to build.

I pointed out that within the recommendation there was no thought for local village infrastructure. I highlighted that the development is likely to bring a further 72 children to the John Blandy School (the planners figures) and although it was recommended that a sum of £997,874 was required from the developer to expand the school, there was no consideration about the likely impact this would have on traffic to and from school at start and finish times.

I highlighted the traffic problems surrounding the One Stop Shop and the dangers that arise from parking on the Faringdon Road and the entrance and exit to and from Cherrytree Close.

#### Scam watch: Driving licence renewals

If you're over 70, watch out for copycat websites when renewing your driving licence. A website that often pops up when searching online looks just like the official DVLA website, but it charges you 90p to renew your licence. If you pay, you will also be enrolled into a recurring fortnightly charge of £38 for services.

You should always go directly to the 'gov.uk' website for government services, such as passport or driving licence renewals. If you fall for a copycat site, you should be able to get your money back using Section 75 of the Consumer Credit Act or a chargeback claim.



Finally, as my 3 minutes ran out, I stressed the dangers that new and existing residents will experience at the access and exit to the new development which will be, according to the planners, 90 metres from the A420 roundabout. There will also be access for approximately 14 houses, from the development, via the Old Oxford Road by the War Memorial Green. Another dangerous crossing.

Our Local District Councillor, Eric Batts, also spoke against the development. He also raised many of the matters brought up previously and reminded the Committee that Kingston Bagpuize and Southmoor had already received more than its fair share of developments.

When it came to the vote every councillor except Eric Batts, who voted against, voted to grant permission. Their reason being that the village is "defined as a large village" in the Vale plan and has "a range of services and facilities, including a shop, community facilities, a primary school, some limited employment opportunities and access to a regular public transport service serving larger towns". So we had all wasted our breath and our time. Local Democracy ????? *Roy Wolfe* 





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#### FEEL LIKE EATING OUT TONIGHT? No: 33 The Red Lion, Northmoor

On a dark damp winter's night the Red Lion stood out like a beacon, situated as it is down an ill lit country lane. Trying to book 48 hours earlier we couldn't get a table for four showing how popular this eatery has become.

Now owned by the community, the Red Lion is run by Lisa, front of house, and Ian in the kitchen. The pub is decorated in the popular modern style of loads of lightwood and pastel colours. There was an immediate welcome as we entered the bar

and where we were quickly served with aperitifs. We opted to go straight to our table and be all ready for the off, despite us arriving early.

So far so good. Scanning the 'Specials' menu in the bar, and the printed menu delivered to our table it's obvious the Red Lion is a step away from the usual pub fare. Starters include Grilled partridge breast and leg, with pear puree and grilled chicory and sherry vinaigrette or how about Venison Carpaccio with hazelnuts, Jerusalem artichokes and Brussel sprout leaves amongst others.

Nearly tempted by the partridge I decided on the Soup of the Day, Parsnip. This was delicious beyond my expectations, creamy and bursting with flavour. I could have gone for a bucket of this and left everything else, but that didn't seem right. So for the main course I chose Pheasant breast, leg meat sausage roll with fondant potato and braised red cabbage. Again a wonderful combination of taste and texture.

The service at the Red Lion was as good as the food. We were looked after by a young man sporting a 'Val Doonican' Christmas jumper probably knitted by his Granny, but good service he gave despite the sartorial statement.

Now just two of the four of us had desserts. The other two had had the starters (see how it works?). This is because I am trying to keep my racing snake figure over Christmas. The choice again was salivating, from Caramelised bread and butter pudding to Clementine pannacotta with poached clementine segments and cranberry biscotti, pure pudding poetry.

So what was the fee for the fine festive feast? Just £109 for four mains, two starters and two puds with a bottle of Rioja and starter drinks. Terrific value. So for Red Lion read great food, pleasant staff and good service. The only downside was the drafty window I sat by. Nothing though that couldn't be fixed by the visit of a good double glazing salesman. Red Lion verdict? Highly recommended. *Eton Lovett*.

KBS14+ is a youth group for teenagers in school years 8 and above, up to the age of 18. We open every Friday during term time, 7.30-9.30 pm. Entry is just £1.50

We meet at the village hall in Southmoor and always have a minimum of 3 DBS checked adults on duty. We run trips, themed nights and activities. ## **Children's Clubs**




## Kingston Bagpuize Cricket Club

#### The Emperor's New Clothes: November 2015

In a significant departure from their usual fare, Kingston Bagpuize Drama Group chose The Emperor's New Clothes as their winter production. Based on the Hans Christian Anderson fairy tale, and adapted for the stage by Richard Hellesden, the production edges towards Pantomime and tells the story of a self-possessed Emperor who completely disregards the responsibilities of his elevated position in his obsession to update his wardrobe, his sartorial ambitions being his sole interest.

Brushing aside the efforts of the Royal Tailor admirably played by Sally Lacey, he is convinced by two rogues that they can make him the perfect outfit.



The play opens with the hall doors being thrown open and the two aforesaid scallywags chased through the auditorium in keystone cop style by Susi Dalton in the guise of the local bobby. This nicely set up the theme as the two crooks having evaded PC Dalton conspired to make their fortune when they meet the Emperor and in short order arrange to fit him out in the perfect garb.

The First Rogue was played by Andrea Spencer who, clearly relishing the part, gave us her full range of facial expressions and 'Arrghs' in true Robert Newton fashion. Backed up by Emily Eastham as her cohort the Second Rogue, they injected life and pace into the production and knitted the whole thing together in some style. The interplay between Emily and Andrea was excellent as well it should be after the number of productions this talented duo have been in together over the last twenty years.

For the first night there were a respectful number in the audience and further respect is due for the lack of prompts (if any).

So where are we? The two rogues convince the Emperor they can make him a suit to end all suits, but it will be expensive and magic as it can only be seen by people of high intelligence not by those of less intellect and not deserving of their jobs. Hence when the outfit is delivered all the Emperor's henchmen think it's superb and well worth the cash, which has now bankrupted the nation.

Mike Lacey cringed and whinged through the entire plot in a perfect rendition of the Royal Treasurer seeing the gold in his coffers draining away to the two fake tailors.

The General played by group new comer George Bonner looked and sounded the part of the military man who, to keep his job, goes along with the plan prancing around the stage in his underwear (very fetching I must say) whilst pretending he too has one of the magic suits ordered by the Emperor for his staff.

Now it is up to the daughter of the Royal Tailor (remember her) young Amelia to put the Emperor straight and tell him he has been conned and he and his courtiers are in fact next-to-naked. The rogues are then caught and the original Royal Tailor is re-appointed and all ends well.

Amelia is another first timer with KBDG and one to keep an eye on for the future methinks. For such a young girl Rebecca Bellis as Amelia was nothing short of superb. Confident, seemingly word and diction perfect, her performance was an absolute pleasure to behold.

The same goes for yet another newcomer Neil Browning as the Emperor. Neil was well chosen for the part with his booming voice and youthful looks he came across well as the incompetent Ruler and the scene where he realises he has been duped was convincingly played and you did feel sorry for the guy.

So that just leaves Mary Elizabeth Shewry who regally played the part of the Queen. Mary Elizabeth looked and sounded just like HM Elizabeth 2 and I reckon Helen Mirren should be careful as her position as number one stand in for HM could be in jeopardy here.

Full marks then to Director Sandra Sabathy in her directorial and KBDG debut. The audience seem to thoroughly enjoy the experience and if I'm honest I did too, far more than I thought I was going to. Sound and lighting were fine, the only aspect of the production I can criticise was the set, it lacked a little finesse

I thought and could have been a tad more professional, but that's not to detract from an otherwise fine production. Well done KBDG. *Ida Ticket*



#### **NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL**

The January meeting of the KBS Parish Council took place on Monday 4th January in the Village Hall, together with 9 members of the public plus District Councillor, Eric Batts.

**Public Participation:** Mr. Van de Mortel, representing the bowls club, raised the issue that the club had applied for S106 funding in June 2015, but had not received any response from VOWH until recently when he had been advised that the PC was responsible for allocating S106 funds. This is incorrect. We (the Parish Council) have yet to receive any S106 funds from Developments within the Village, and these are normally distributed to the organisations concerned, with specific projects that have been approved by VOWH, supported by the Parish Council. The Parish Council is in dispute with the Vale, over monies already allocated. Another meeting is to be called with the VOWH, to discuss outstanding issues, supported by our District Councillor.

Accounts: The precept for financial year 16/17 was set at £37,740, which represents a considerable increase on last year, brought about by additional costs to the council of developments within the village, such as land transfers / legal fees, a significant increase in 'The Clerks' workload which will require an assistant, and a number of other factors. For full details, please refer to Jan. Minutes (these can be found on the Village Web Site www.kbsonline.org.uk) where the budget is detailed.

**Matters Arising:** a) The resignation of one of our councillors, Mrs. Audrey Goodgame, is announced, after many years of sterling service. The Chairman would wish to thank Mrs. Goodgame for her many years of service to the community, which is much appreciated by other members of the council, who wish her well in the future. This means that there is a vacancy on the council, should anyone wish to apply! b) Letter received from Lord Lts' office regarding the upcoming 90th birthday celebrations of H.M. The Queen. The letter requests local activity support, planning and co-ordination with Church of England for various celebrations that may be planned. c) Complaints received from residents of Cherrytree Close regarding parking and congestion issues and associated safety caused by deliveries to the One Stop Shop. Steps will be considered to introduce traffic control measures.

Residents are requested to note the introduction of a dedicated Parish Council Mobile tel.no: 07908 472827 in order to contact the Clerk.

**Planning:** The application for outline planning consent for up to 280 dwellings on land south of A420 and east of the A415 was approved at a committee meeting held by the VOWH on Wed 13th Jan, despite detailed objections from the Parish Council, and District Councillor, Eric Batts. No infrastructure planning was indicated to have been incorporated to deal with this number of additional houses, and will therefore impact with a lack of resources in the future, unless addressed.

Land off Field Close: The planning committee requested a further noise impact survey from the applicant as of yet this is not forthcoming and so no decision notice will be issued until it is and has been assessed.

Eden Cottage Faringdon Road: As the Parish Council has objected this is likely to come to committee but as yet no dated fixed.

Sports Ground and Pavilion Abingdon Road: Landscape section have requested more information. Oak Barn Rectory Lane: A decision is expected in the next 2 to 3 weeks.

**Village Amenities:** A replacement SEE-SAW has been installed and welcomed by many of the children, judging by reports received.

**Faults:** Complaints received regarding the over bright all night lights from One Stop Shop representing light pollution. Efforts will be made to have the level of lighting after midnight, reduced.

**Dog Fouling**: Again, complaints received regarding the level of dog fouling, over the Christmas period, particularly in the area of Cherrytree Close and the One Stop shop to a level, hitherto, not experienced.

VOWHDC dog wardens will be requested to conduct further patrols. The fine for failing to remove Dog Excrement is currently £80. Bins are provided around the Village, and the number could be increased. The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held Monday 1st Feb, Village Hall 7 P.M. *Brian Forster, Chair.* 



PLEASE pick up after your dog, use the bins provided and also keep your hedges and trees cut back from the footpaths and clear the cuttings away. It is becoming increasingly difficult at times, especially now the darker evenings are upon us, to walk along the footpaths without getting poked in the eye with overhanging trees and bushes or stepping in dog faeces. Please remember that if shrubs or bushes are on your property it is your responsibility to keep them trimmed back from public footpaths.



## Housing Proposal at Springfield Farm

A public consultation was held in the Village Hall in December, detailing the proposed housing development at Springfield Farm.

Local residents came along to discuss the proposals with representatives from the project team. The scheme comprises up to 25 homes with associated discreet car parking, of which 15 could be open market homes and 10 could be affordable homes (40%). With a mix of 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 bed dwellings across the site and a public open space in the heart of the scheme. The development will also feature 'Green wildlife corridors' for ecology and retention of key landscaping features (e.g. existing mature trees, pond and orchard). Pedestrian and vehicular access points will be off Bullockspits Lane.



#### **News from The Village Hall**

The seasonal festivities are over, the Village Hall decorations have been packed away for another year and its back to normal for most clubs and organisations. I would like to add a big thank you to those of you who volunteered your Sunday morning in December to come along to help with preparing the hall for Christmas.

Portable Appliances Testing: On 15th December the annual (PAT testing) was carried out on nearly 40 Portable Appliances kept at the Village Hall, ranging from kettles to refrigerators and from radios to extension leads. PAT Testing is a legal requirement to ensure the safety and welfare of users. A number of items hitherto not tested were discovered in cupboards and a reminder that any appliance brought into the hall must be tested before use or it may be removed.

Review of Hire Charges: At a recent meeting of the Management Committee a review of hire charges was discussed and it was agreed that with effect from 1st April 2016 a small average increase of 2% across most bookings will be applied. The last increase in hire charges was in April 2013 and it was felt that this small increase will help offset some of the Village Hall running costs.

Booking Secretary: The Village Hall will shortly have a vacancy for new booking secretary to join its management team. This voluntary position comes with a desktop computer and a dedicated mobile telephone, to enable you to operate from home, and offers an opportunity to be a vital link with the village community. 
#### SOUTHMOOR PRE-SCHOOL

## THE KBS NEWS WINE LIST: WINES OF THE MONTH



Christmas and New Year are now behind us and after all the excesses we thought we should try some reasonably priced wine, which we hope you will enjoy.

We chose on this occasion wine from Sicily perhaps not everyone's choice area when looking for a bottle of wine but we have found over a long period that some very good wines come from that island.

The white wine we chose is Inycon Terre Siciliane 2014, a Chardonnay Pinot Grigio blend. This complex, yet easy drinking wine with intense citrus and tropical notes is perfectly balanced with refreshing acidity. For those liking white wine as a refreshing drink won't be disappointed. Serve it cold equally it will be a good partner for fish or a prawn starter.

The red wine also originates from the same producer and is the Inycon Terre Siciliane 2014 Nero D'Avola Frappato blend. The deep inky D'Avola blends perfectly with the lighter Frappato grapes to create a wine with amazing colour and depth and flavours of damson, black cherries and raspberries burst through. You can choose what you eat it with, but why not do as we did, drink it in good company and enjoy?

Both wines came from Waitrose and were  $\pounds 5.99$  each when purchased. The white wine has an alcohol content of 12.5% and the red 13%. Cheers, The Wine Quartet

# **POLICE** Bank Scam Warning

Thames Valley Police is urging residents to be on their guard amid reports of fraudsters targeting unsuspecting victims and convincing

them to hand over large sums of cash.

Recently five people in Abingdon have handed over a total of about £25,000 in cash after being contacted by telephone by fraudsters asking for money. The caller claimed to be a police officer, fraud investigator or bank employee. He convinced victims to withdraw cash by claiming he needed the victim to work undercover to expose fraud or because their bank account had been compromised.

Some victims hung up on the fraudster and then telephoned their bank to confirm this claim straight away. However the fraudster had kept the telephone line open so, even though a number was dialed, it was not connected. The victims were still on the phone to the fraudsters and were further misled by a woman falsely claiming to be from the bank who repeated the deception.

The victims were convinced to withdraw cash from their bank accounts, seal it in an envelope and hand it to a courier who called at their door later that evening. One woman was tricked into transferring cash into another bank account. Another woman was also convinced to buy two Rolex watches from a jeweller and hand them to a courier.

The couriers who collected cash from victims were described as follows: One courier was described as slim Asian man.

Another was described as Asian, in his late twenties, slim and less than 6ft tall. He spoke with an English accent.

Another was described as Asian, in his early thirties, 5ft 10ins and overweight. He was wearing a dark fleece with numbers on the shoulder.

Another was described as Asian, in his thirties, 5ft 4ins, slim, with short dark hair and a black beard. He was wearing a white zip up jacket.

Det Sgt Francesca Jarvis of local CID based at Abingdon police station, said: "We continue to work hard to prevent and detect offences of courier fraud across the Thames Valley. The offenders are very plausible and target honest and upstanding members of the community. Unfortunately they target vulnerable people, including the elderly. The more we can spread the word about this type of fraud the less success the fraudsters will have. I would urge everyone to remain vigilant and ensure you, your friend and family, know what to do should someone attempt this fraud.

Take a moment to discuss it with loved ones to prevent yourself and people you know from becoming a victim of these types of scams.

One of the victims was also told to buy Rolex watches and went to Goldsmiths jewellers in the Clarendon Shopping Centre, Cornmarket Street, Oxford at about 4pm on Wednesday 23 December 2015 and 10am on Thursday 24 December.

She bought watches on the first visit and the man who collected them from her home was described as Asian, in his thirties, 5ft 4ins, slim, with short dark hair and a black beard. He was wearing a white zip up jacket. She may have been watched as she went to the jewellers and I would like to speak to anyone who saw anyone acting suspiciously in the area at these times to get in touch."

\* Your bank will never send a courier to your home.

\* Your bank and police will never ask for your PIN.\* If you want to call your bank do so from another telephone.

\* If you have handed over any details to fraudsters contact your bank immediately and cancel your cards.

\* If you receive one of these calls end it immediately.

\* If you receive this type of call, report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040, or via their website. In an emergency dial 999.

Anyone with information should contact Det Sgt Francesca Jarvis of local CID based at Abingdon police station via the 24-hour Thames Valley Police enquiry centre on 101.

If you don't want to speak directly to the police you can contact the independent charity Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111. No personal details are taken, information is not traced or recorded and you will not go to court.

Winter Programmes: The winter (off season) may seem for a driver like a time to relax and do nothing until the season starts again in early March/April.

However, this is far from the case, with fitness training programmes, sponsorship proposals and team signings; all part of the hectic winter time, in order to make the year run as smoothly as possible, so when it comes to the racing I can focus on my driving and not have to worry about getting things sorted.

With fitness training, endless different approaches can be taken to ensure highest possible performance levels. for

example, running is a very good form of cardio, but puts a lot of strain on ankles and joints, so may reduce your physical ability. I enjoy cycling, which is a very good cardio sport and is very low impact, so high levels of fitness can be achieved. Bodyweight training, rather than using weights, is very good as well, as not much strain is put on the muscles, and they get used to doing fast movements with resistance.

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Finding sponsors and business partners is one of the hardest parts of the off season time, with a budget needing to be put together and a testing programme as well. Without partners and sponsors, a testing programme is nearly impossible. As I am sure some are aware, racing is a very expensive sport and working with partners and sponsors is a key part of success for all involved, and is very rewarding for both parties. Sponsors and partners can enjoy VIP access to all races including stickers on the car, track days for clients and will receive a lot of publicity. That is why motorsport is a great platform to market companies, so we know we will have a good working relationship with them.

The off season is also the time to agree contracts with a team. It requires negotiation to ensure you cover all the needs for the year from what they offer. This can be done with several teams to see which you prefer. This is what I did in 2013 to find the Ginetta team I would be running with. For this year, I know that I will be running with that same team, TCR, so putting a proposal together was easier. I have been lucky to sign for this team again as they are the current championship holder for the GT5.

I attended the Autosport show at the NEC Birmingham in January, which is the main motorsport show of the year. A lot of announcements are made at the show as it is a focal point for motorsport fans, so a keen interest is taken to see who moves where and into what. It was great opportunity to meet up with other drivers in the team as well as the race organisers and equipment suppliers. I am really keen to get behind the wheel of the car again as soon as possible, but I will probably have to wait until March for that. *Matt Chapman*,


