Here we go again!

Plans for the building of another huge development in what was once our village were unveiled at a 'consultation event' in the village hall on 1st June.

The proposed site, south of the A420, east of the Witney Road, is currently identified for 280 new houses in the emerging Local Plan.

Developers Mactaggart and Mickel hosted the event to glean villagers' input and reaction to the proposal.

The plan is for 98 affordable homes plus 182 private dwellings, both categories to include 1 and 2 bed apartments with 2, 3 and 4 bedroom houses. Access is to be on to the Witney Road with an emergency vehicular outlet to the old Oxford Road.

How our school and facilities will cope with such an influx is another matter but what the Witney Road ever did to deserve such attention is beyond me. The developers reckon it will mean 150 vehicles entering the Witney Road in the morning peak time. However this will encourage more traffic cutting through the village to access the A420 near the Lamb & Flag. What we need is a Bypass. Lance Bassett



DANGERS AHEAD FOR PUBLIC TRANSPORT

At the quarterly meeting of Parish Transport Representatives on the 17th of June the County Council dropped a bombshell - The Council has calculated the level of additional cuts to the transport budget that will have to be made in 2016 amounting in total to £6.25 million.

The proposal is that £3.75 million should be cut from statutory services (school buses, etc.) and £2.5 million from subsidised bus services. In respect of the latter, two alternatives have been proposed by Officers. To prioritise offpeak services which are most likely to be used by the elderly and vulnerable residents or to withdraw ALL subsidies across the board. There are to be twelve weeks of public consultation on the proposals, lasting until the end of August, to which I would urge everyone to respond. Questionnaires will be available online, from public libraries, County Hall and the Vale of White Horse District Offices in Abingdon. There will also be a series of public meetings:

6th July Didcot 4pm – 5.30pm 7th July Witney Methodist Hall

10.30am - 12 Noon

8th July Abingdon Guildhall

4pm – 5.30pm

8th July County Hall, Oxford

7pm - 8.30pm

At the end of the consultation and evaluation of the public response the County Council will vote on the issues and its decisions implemented in Spring of next year.

According to the Oxford Times, motorists travelling into Oxford between October and December took an average of 14 minutes 26 seconds to complete one mile of morning travel on the Botley Road last year. Figures for 2014 show an average of 9,300 vehicles made the trip into central Oxford during the morning peak compared with 9,200 in 2013 and 9,000 in 2012 and naturally are taking longer than ever to complete their journeys. Oxfordshire County Council's cabinet member for transport David Nimmo Smith said he was aware of the problems and was trying to find solutions.

So, it takes longer to get from Botley into Oxford than it does to get from here to Botley. So what to the powersthat-be do to alleviate the situation? Grant permission for a supermarket on the old MFI site on the Botley Road.

to drive into Oxford at any time in the future, my thoughts are with you, and don't forget to take a packed lunch.

FEEL LIKE EATING OUT TONIGHT? No: 27 The Beetle & Wedge, Moulsford.

For years you can cherish the memory of a restaurant, a particularly good meal, favourite menu or a memorable occasion. So it was with me and the Beetle & Wedge. I lunched there on the odd occasion before retirement beckoned, and was therefore looking forward to my visit this time. This is where the sweet mysteries of life kick in.

As soon as you opened the door you know something has changed. No instant greeting, just stand there and wait to be acknowledged.

Now for anyone who hasn't been to the Beetle & Wedge, it nestles on the very edge of the Thames at Moulsford. The Boathouse restaurant being just a few feet away from the river. A magnificent setting on a summer's day when the whole of the side of restaurant is opened up.

Perhaps I was expecting too much, just as the proprietors were when they priced up the wine list here. So we four proceeded with caution. Pre-dinner drinks at the table and straight into the menu.

We were told the duck had all gone, (strange for a riverside eatery), just the two starters then. I went for the Toasted Crumpet with English Asparagus with poached egg and Hollandaise, very good it was too.

Now the Beetle always used to serve a tasty Sea Bass but I guess this has long since gone. So one of our party joined me in the Rump of Streatley Lamb, French peas and Dauphinoise potatoes. (All main courses are also served with Rosti potato). You did need a drink to recover from the prices on the Wine List so we batted in favour of the House wine, a Chilean Merlot, which as you would expect wasn't the best red wine I've ever sipped. Still such is life.

The lamb arrived eventually, (the service was very good in all honesty) and although juicy and tender the meat lacked the flavour the poor thing deserved. The potatoes were excellent (both types), and in fairness after ploughing through the dish I couldn't eat another morsel and called for the bill.

The bride chose a Wild Mushroom Risotto (the mushrooms can get a tad irate Streatley way). This she considered tasteless and this was followed by a terrine of summer pudding again tasteless and dry was the verdict. Oh dear. The bill arrived. For years I never checked restaurant bills just glancing at them and usually thinking that's about right. Nowadays I always check them and advise others to do the same, often there is a mistake and tonight was no exception. They had charged for an extra main course at £18.95 we hadn't had. The duck of all things, which I would have had if it had been available!

So all in all, a disappointing evening and another memory shattered. The bill came to a just £124 for four main courses, two starters and one pud, a bottle of house wine and three pre-dinner drinks so not too bad. Eton Lovett

THE KBS NEWS WINE LIST: WINES OF THE MONTH



Following a tasting at the Village Wine Circle Meeting earlier this month, we decided to choose two of the wines as our July Wines. The tasting was of Californian Wines and in general all of them were very good, the exception being

the white wines which were very disappointing.

Therefore we have selected the following two red wines which we hope you will try and enjoy, they are a little more expensive than the wines we usually recommend, but worth it.

The first wine is a Beringer California Cabernet Sauvignon 2013 from Asda, costing £9.50. The Beringer St Helena Winery was founded in 1876 and has become the oldest continuously operating winery in the Napa Valley. This Cabernet Sauvignon is characterised by brooding blackberry and cherry fruits with beautifully balanced vanilla oak spice, wonderful with any BBQ food, so if you are near an Asda some time, pop in and buy one.

The second wine is a Scotto Zinfandel 2011 from The Oxford Wine Company, costing £10.50. This winery was founded in 1903 when Dominic Scotto moved his family from Italy to California, and his skills have been passed on through five generations to his Great Grandson Anthony Scotto who currently runs the winery. This wine is an Old Vine Zinfandel, with spicy red fruit aromas with a hint of dark chocolate, rich and full flavoured, brimming with elegant plum and cassis flavours, it is balanced with a lick of vanilla and a hint of spice. A superb wine and one to try. Cheers, *The Wine Quartet*


SERENDIPITY OVER 55's CLUB

Summer party time

If you followed last month's tip on water butts and purchased one, it will at least have been put to good use! Hopefully July will be drier; here's our tips for the month.

Roses will now just be over their first flush of flowers. To encourage flowering later in the season, cut the stem (once every flower on it has faded) - down to the first main leaf you reach.

Apples/pears grown as espalier/cordon need a summer prune; this allows sunlight to ripen the fruit and ensures good cropping next year. Cut four leaves up from this year's growth, and prune just above where the leaf is attached. NB if you have a tree, then winter is the time to prune, not now.

Don't forget to keep sowing salad seeds. Ideally, regular sowings should be made every two weeks to give a continuous supply. Long rectangular containers are great for this, or just any pot that you have to hand. There's no talk this month. Instead the club has its annual garden party and BBQ. NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The June meeting of the KBS Parish Council took place on Monday June 1st in the Village Hall, together with 12 members of the public, District Councillor, Eric Batts, and County

Councillor, Mrs Melinda Tilley.

Public Participation. Several members expressed concern over the proposal by a company known as Mactaggart and Mickel, for 280 dwellings, north of the old Oxford Road, and South of the A420, accessed principally from the A415, opposite the existing David Wilson Homes, Orchard Gate Development. The impact on traffic on the A415, the capacity of John Blandy School, Foul Water capacity, were all cited as cause for concern. One resident suggested a campaign to divert through traffic from the Village (A BYPASS?).

Reports From District and County Councillor. Mrs Tilley advised that construction of a Pedestrian Crossing on the Abingdon Road will now be delayed until S106 monies from the proposed development of 280 houses north of the Old Oxford Road are available and the need reassessed in the light of predicted additional foot traffic. This is too long, a) since the money from Orchard Gate is soon to be available, and b) the need already exists, and will be a further requirement, as the Orchard Gate development is occupied, especially for Care Home Residents

Improved signage is being considered at the Pinewoods Rd junction, and lowered speed limits on the A420/415 roundabout are under consideration as part of the OCC working group, considering the impact of development on the A420. OCC plan to establish a cycle way to Oxford, utilising the underpass on the A420 at Fyfield, using the Longworth/Appleton road, thus creating a safe route via Cumnor and Botley.

Both Councillors stressed the importance of developing a NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN to drive forward improvements to Village Facilities. We are not unaware of neighbourhood plans. Our advice has been that until the Vale had created and had approved a Local Plan, then neighbourhood plans were of little value, plus the costs were originally estimated at up to £40,000, a sum that was not considered affordable, even with an increased precept, although that sum has now decreased considerably, but will still require considerable expenditure. One of our new Councillors, Dr. J. Allsworth has now taken on initial responsibility for the creation of such a neighbourhood plan. **Co-option of councillor**. Mr S Smith, of Cherry Tree Close has been co-opted to fill the final vacancy on the council, and has signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

Recruitment of Clerk. Mr D.Groves, of Blandy Avenue has been appointed as Clerk to the council W.E.F. 1st July, and brings with him, many years experience of Council work, which should be of great advantage to us. The Council thanks our Clerk of 15 years standing, Mr J Melling, for soldiering on until a replacement could be found.

Road Safety. Volunteers are sought locally, to operate a speed camera on local roads, any offenders are not prosecuted, but cautioned as to their driving speeds. This is in conjunction with numerous local villages having concerns with speeding within the confines of their Villages, and a project to purchase said camera for use within Faringdon East Neighbourhood group. The Clerk is to write to local M.P. Ed Vaizey, with regard to the delay on the Abingdon Road Crossing.

S106 Monies. A meeting took place during May, between Officers of the VWHDC and a number of concerned sports groups, and organisations regarding the disbursement of allocated sums to these groups, which, since large sums have been handed over to the Vale by developers, should now be passed on to those groups who have had sums allocated. A sticking point was the issue of a site for a "Parkour" or Free running activity, and the current lack of a suitable site for such. An apparent compromise was reached with the Village Hall Chair, offering facilities, and the hall, for an indoor or outdoor version as weather dictates using non permanent equipment. **Vale Strategic Plan**. Residents should be aware of a submission by St John's College, for a further 500 houses to be built between the field opposite the Sports field on the A415, and going North until the A420 the other side of the Old Oxford Road, with a new Roundabout on the A420, bounded on the West side by the Bowls Club, and the Eastern Boundary of the recently proposed Mactaggart and Mickel site. The proposal includes a new Primary School and a "Local Centre". Whether this means a Village Hall or Medical Centre is, as yet uncertain. So, the madness continues. This development, I believe, would have no affinity with our village, and would or could become a separate entity, whilst at the same time destroying our surrounding Countryside, not to mention the further impact on the A420/415 traffic situation, foul water, and energy requirements.

Those of you who may feel strongly on the issue are urged to lobby your local Councillors, and in particular, your local M.P. Their Tanks On Our Lawns! The next meeting of The KBS Parish Council will be on Monday 6th July at the Village Hall, *Brian Forster Chair KBS Parish Council*.

280 more houses in the village by Roy Wolfe

Having visited the Public Exhibition in the Village Hall it seemed to me that

the biggest problem with all the developments in the village is the lack of foresight by the Local Planning Authority and Government regarding infrastructure. Each developer has said the roads are good enough to cope with their development, the school is big enough to cope with their development, the utilities (Water, Sewage, Electricity, Gas) can cope with their development, there is a shop and a post office in the village for everyone to make use of, the doctors are only a bus ride away, there's an excellent Village Hall, there's plenty of facilities for youth with Scouts, Guides, Brownies and Cubs, there's a youth club etc, etc, etc.

The point that seems to have been missed is that together the new housing will add over 600 houses to the village and the above weren't designed for a 60% increase.

So, my suggestion is that the planners insist on the following as part of any agreement to that latest development.

- 1. According to the plans, access to the development appears to be in two places (just down from the David Wilson development access and from the Old Oxford Road by the War Memorial) where 'disasters will be waiting to happen'. I would like to see the scheme, if it were to go ahead, incorporate a redirection of the A415. My suggestion would be a link from the existing A415 at the point which the Kingston Bagpuize Industrial Estate road starts, across to the fields arriving at the A420 alongside the eastern edge of the proposed development. The section of the A415 from the Industrial Estate road towards Kingston Bagpuize could then be closed, stopping 'Through Traffic' past the proposed access points and removing the potential 'disasters waiting to happen'. This would make a much, much safer residential area and perhaps, restore something of the village atmosphere.
- 2. I do not believe the local school will be able to cope with such a vast increase in children from the new houses. I understand that the school currently has 30 spaces across ALL of it's classes and therefore additional classrooms would need to be built. At the Exhibition a representative from the developer claimed that children from the proposed new houses could walk to school, crossing the A415, through the David Wilson development, down School Lane and across the playing field. Nice idea but how fanciful.

New Classrooms would inevitably bring more local traffic and there is already much understandable friction between local residents and parents delivering and collecting children from school by car. Adding to the school numbers is likely to be the last straw for many residents on the Blandy estate. I therefore suggest that a new school should be included in any development plan and at a location, to which parents can drive, without causing so much annoyance to nearby homes. I doubt whether the location could be within the proposed development as this would just move the traffic problem from one area to another. Perhaps a site could be found along the part of the closed A415 where sufficient space for buildings, parking and playing fields could be accommodated.

- 3. There is a constant call from the village for a Doctors surgery. The additional properties make this need even greater. Currently a 10 minute appointment at the doctors in Faringdon, for a resident who is reliant on the Bus service, could mean a 2 hour round trip. Not ideal for elderly people and families with young children who may need to see a doctor more often than the more mobile amongst us.
- 4. The village is served by one shop with very limited parking. Even now, cars can be found parked along the main village road, blocking lines of sight from existing roads and driveways. This can only get worse with even more houses. The village now needs a more dedicated retail area with much greater parking facilities.
- 5. The Local Scouts, Guides, Cubs and Brownies need a new purpose built building. This would ideally be on land already allocated on the David Wilson site but could incorporate specific Youth Club facilities which are missing in the village. These facilities could be elsewhere if an appropriate site was available. Who would pay for all this, one might ask. Rumour has it that the David Wilson site on the Witney road was bought for £15 million. If this is the case, then one can only imagine what would be the value of the Oxford Road fields. Does it not seem reasonable that some of this money could go to the Village infrastructure above. This would of course leave less for the land owners but I suspect they would still be left somewhat wealthier than they started. So, any thoughts? Why not let us all know what you think. 
Youth Matters

Mark Potts' Kitchen Talk

Seasonality is very important to us when planning a menu in the kitchen, if you eat foods in

their right seasons it has major benefits, cost and flavour being the main two. This time of year really is my favourite and the menus are quite easy to write as there is just so much fantastic local produce to use, as well as our own farm and kitchen garden. This little recipe makes a fantastic soup and is so easy to make.

Wild garlic and potato soup: to serve four Thinly slice an onion and sweat without colour in a little oil. Thinly slice four jersey royal potatoes and add them to the onions season with salt at this point. Seasoning as you go helps to draw out flavour. Add a pint of chicken stock and simmer gently vegetable stock would be fine as well if you need to cater for vegetarians. Let this cook on a low heat for around half an hour until the potatoes are cooked. Now you add wild garlic. It only has a six week season but has such a great flavour. You need around 500g. Drop this into the liquid and let cook for around two minutes. This short cooking will just take away the very bitter garlic taste. Blitz with a hand blender or food processor. We always push it through a sieve as it can be stringy. You're left with a lovely soup that can be eaten hot or cold. It's fine on it's own with some bread but a poached egg or horseradish yogurt would be a good accompaniment.
