Where have all the flowers gone?



When passing the Memorial Crescent, readers may have observed the notices that replaced the wreaths by stones 2 & 4. Those who could spare the time to look more closely will know that the two wreaths have been 'Transferred to Front Line Duty' on the graves of William John Adams and Vincent Hubert Viner, two men from our village who were killed in 1916, the year of The Battle of The Somme.

The occasion for the transfer was the winner of last November's Memorial Crescent Raffle visiting France for a week, inclusive of a guided tour of the Somme Battlefield.

Mr Jason Moody, the raffle winner from Southmoor, his wife Lorraine and her Mum and Dad, Alan and Mary Foster were conducted across the 25 mile wide battle field, as it was on that fateful 'first day', 1 July, 1916. Towards sunset, Mr Moody laid one of the Memorial Crescent wreaths on the grave of William John Adams, in Caterpillar Valley Cemetery, which is not far from where William was killed, age 30, by our own artillery whilst forming-up on the edge of Mametz Wood to attack the enemy in the village of Bazentin-le-Petit. The inscription on the wreath reads

"WILLIAM JOHN ADAMS was from Kingston Bagpuize with Southmoor, Oxfordshire. This wreath was transferred from our village War Memorial Crescent on 7 May, 2013 – and laid here on behalf of all the village by Mr Jason Moody, Southmoor. IN REMEMBRANCE AND WITH THANKS".

The next day, the second Memorial Crescent wreath was similarly laid onto the grave of Vincent Hubert Viner, at Habarcq Cemetery, near Arras. Vincent, age 19, was killed nearby, by enemy artillery. *Rob Belk*.

There will be lots of stalls and sideshows including a Grand Teddybola, Bouncy Slide, BBQ, Pimm's, Teas, Bottle Stall, Strawberries & Cream and lots more. Many of the village organisations will have their own stalls too.

So put the date in your diary, Saturday 15th June gates open at Ipm until 4pm. The fete is organised by St John the Baptist Church and is held in the beautiful grounds of Kingston Bagpuize House with kind permission of Mrs Virginia Grant.

The latest site for desecration is the old Oxford Road where, presumably, the fact the road is no longer used as a thoroughfare makes some people think it is now available as a dogs toilet. Well here's a bit of news, the old Oxford Road is a public place and as such the law requires doggie doodoo to be cleared up.

Now as you will know I am not one to complain, but many people walk along that piece of road, including myself you'll understand, and I am not sure why we should have to dodge the doggie doo (again being polite) left by some inconsiderate dog owners, especially as the Parish Council supplies endless dog bins at great expense to the taxpayer for the convenience (no pun intended) of the pet owner.

Dog mess is an eyesore and a health hazard. The law states if you are a dogowner, you have a legal duty to clean up every time your dog messes in a public place, except guide dogs. There is also exemption for dog owners on some kinds of public land, including agricultural or woodland, rural common land and marshland, moor or heath, plus highways with a speed limit of 50mph or more. The old Oxford Road is none of these you will note.

Inconsiderate Parking. It is noticed that vehicles are regularly parking, wholly or partially, on the footpaths of our village roads. This can be very dangerous for people with visual problems and disabled people who may be in a wheelchair or mobility scooter. It is also dangerous for parents with pushchairs and toddlers, who may be taking their children to school or pre-school. Not only is it creating problems to pedestrians but it is also ILLEGAL.

Vehicles are also being parked on both sides of the road, almost opposite each other, creating a chicane. Sometimes it is a struggle to get a car along the road. It would be almost impossible to get an emergency vehicle along the road especially during the night.

Please consider other people when parking your vehicle. It may be you requiring an emergency vehicle at night and finding that you cannot get help because the ambulance or fire engine can't get through. (Name and address withheld)

While not wishing to offend the owners of properties which lie adjacent to land off Town Pond Lane, for which planning permission is currently being sort, we can really not understand how this parcel of land can be considered to be outside the built-up area of the village.

There are numerous properties on both sides of this lane and an extensive alteration/extension was permitted opposite this site several years ago which totally destroyed the outlook of what was then the home of Mr & Mrs Stringer. In addition, while the new property which has been squeezed in between their old home and that previously referred to, might be considered 'infill' it must in all honestly have had a far more direct and detrimental impact on both these properties that two rather modest buildings will have on any houses in the vicinity, other than the property on the corner, which admittedly does have a clear aspect and free view to the Downs, but is at a reasonably high level when compared with the site in question.

As far as being outside the village built up area is concerned, what now constitutes the built up area? Practically all the parcels of land currently being considered for planning approval must also surely be outside the village built up area, and from our recollection of previously published village plans, should not, even now, be under consideration.

As far as the two properties mentioned in last month's edition of the Village News are concerned, they will surely have little effect on adjacent properties as far as visual impact is concerned, nor it would seem on vehicular movement in the immediate vicinity. It should also be borne in mind how much good work Paul Weaving and his family have given to the village over many years and the granting of planning approval for this site, with the support of the village, would be a very small reward for all their efforts in the past. FEEL LIKE EATING OUT TONIGHT?

No: 5 The Chequers, Charney Bassett

This venue having been booked by friends I was interested to see if things had improved since my last visit which admittedly was some time ago. The thing I most remember last time is being frozen and eating with my coat on. How things have changed. Under new management for the past six months, the Chequers now boasts a roaring wood burner and warm the bar it certainly does. Phew, what a scorcher!

We opted to go immediately to our table. The landlord and his lady were very friendly and keen to point out the daily specials.

The Chequers now has a real cosy atmosphere and although the restaurant was far from full there was a smattering of diners to make the point that you weren't the only people eating out that night and rattling around the dining room alone.

The menu is varied and not too long to be confusing and for starters I went for the Deep Fried Whitebait. This turned up in good time and was presented very well with a salad garnish and homemade tartare sauce. Delicious about describes it.

So to the main event. Selecting the Game Pie from the hand written Specials menu the very pleasant lady left with us, I settled down with a glass of red and waited with relish, 'cos I do like Game Pie.

Voila! I wasn't disappointed. Again in good time the dish of golden puff pastry appeared covering a full serving of venison, pheasant and a hint of rabbit in a delicious gravy and really was as good as it looked. With a side serving of fries and peas this was English Inn fare at its best.

Writing a review of local hostelries I am always looking out for something at least to criticise, but of late there seems little or nothing that causes alarm. Whether it is the recession that has sharpened people's game, the stiff competition round about or perhaps we are just lucky to live where we do with so many eateries in reach with such high standards.

So with an excellent two course quality meal and two bottles of Shiraz, the meal was just over £50 per couple. The new owners are working hard to put the Chequers on the local restaurant map and judging by this experience it certainly seems to be paying off. *Dinah Outte*

stems for cutting or showing, it is best to remove these small side buds as soon as possible, pick them off with your finger and thumb, this is called 'disbudding' the remaining bud and subsequent bloom will be better and stronger. Also check around the main stem of your roses for suckers, these appear at the point where the growth emerges through the soil, trace these suckers or briers back to their source at the base of the plant and carefully cut them off clear of the rootstock. Give your roses a fortnightly liquid feed during their growing season, and regularly check for signs of disease such as Mildew and Black-spot, spray with systemic rose insecticide if green or blackfly appear.

This month's favourite vegetable is Sweetcorn, if sown in pots in the greenhouse or on a warm windowsill during May they should have produce strong plants ready to planting out in situ this month providing the weather is warm enough, if it is still a bit cold be prepared to give them some protection with fleece or place them under a cloche. Sweetcorn is wind pollinated and best planted in groups so the male flowers at the top of the plant can pollinate the female tassels lower down. When ready for harvesting later (July to September) the cobs are sweet and delicious when cooked or barbecued and served with butter. Remember to make sure you keep all your emerging seedlings and young plants well watered and guard against unwelcomed pests. *Ron Green*

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NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The ANNUAL meeting of the KBS Parish Council was held on Monday 13th May in the Village Hall together with Clr. Melinda Tilley, District and newly re-elected County councillor, and two members of the public.



Election of Chairman. Mr Forster was nominated by Mr. Bassett, seconded by Mr Charlton. There being no further nominations, Mr. Forster was duly elected.

Election of Vice-Chairman. No nominations were made for this position: the position therefore remains vacant. To be discussed at the next meeting in June.

Members of committees. For members of committees, please refer to minutes, as the list is extensive.

Representatives of KB Cricket Club and Kingston Colts invited the Parish Council to provide three members of a reconstituted Sports Field Committee, when they met recently with the Chairman, Mr. Chartres and the Clerk. This invitation was approved by the Council, in view of their strong support for the proposed development of a new pavilion and lease of the grounds to the Parish Council, linked to the erection of 12 new dwellings adjacent to the sports field.

Public Participation. Mrs Grant welcomed the Council's continuing support for the Sports Field proposal which would allow a new sports pavilion to be erected on the present site, plus an extension of the sports field to provide further football pitches. Mrs. Tilley encouraged the clubs using the site to write to support the application and to approach Sport England and OCC Youth Services for independent support.

Report from District and County Councillor. Mrs Tilley noted her recent re- election as County Councillor, the Ward now covers some 19 Parishes, which will preclude her attendance at all Parish Council meetings, in future. If unable to attend, A written report will be submitted.

Planning. In view of.forthcoming negotiations over land transfers and leases, it was agreed that the Clerk invite Challenors, Solicitors, to act on on the PC's behalf.

Applications received: Erection of 12 new dwellings, replacement Sports Pavilion, enlarged sports pitches, and new public footpath link. Expenditure of up to £500 to support the application by commissioning an independent report on the need for the sports facilities was approved. Mr. Chartres is in communication with Ms. A. Robinson, head of strategic planning VWHDC, as to how this is best achieved!

Decisions. OUTLINE application for a residential development comprising of up to 63 dwellings, up to 45 extra care units, public open space, land for Scout Group and new site access. PERMIT.

Application for reserved Matters for erection of 50 dwellings, Public Open Space, and new vehicular access, land south of Faringdon Rd. PERMIT

The Chairman and Clerk had met with a representative of Messrs. Pye Ltd; Council agreed to acquire the area in the North–East corner, excluding the site boundary hedges, and the adopted access road. Members expressed a wish for allotments and Youth facilities on the land to the south of the development, which will be leased to the Parish Council. Erection of 98 residential dwellings with associated open space, structural landscaping and aces, Land off Draycott Rd. PERMIT. It was agreed that the Public Open Space on the site be transferred to the Parish Council.

Further S106 Planning gain is being sought, including road/traffic safety issues, including provision of pedestrian crossings, at other locations, and further Youth facilities, possibly on the site or in the vicinity of the Village Hall.

There are many planning conditions on this site, the greatest of which, is the expansion of the sewage farm to cope with the increased effluent. No work can begin until the increased capacity is in place. This work to be carried out by Thames Water at the developers cost. For remainder of decisions, please refer to May Minutes.

Accounts. The previously circulated Financial Statement and Annual Return for the Year to March 2013 were approved and submitted for return to the internal auditor.

Donations. A donation to the Western Vale fighting fund was approved to support an independant traffic assessment of the A420. This is as a result of the current proposals for up to 4000 houses on the western fringes of Swindon and will be used to inform and influence the VWHDC Local plan.

Village Amenities. Recreation Grounds. The Large litter bin has been vandalised to the point of requiring replacement (cost to Village Funds). Some equipment requires maintenance.

Faults. A number of complaints have been received regarding the condition of the Old Oxford Rd. in regard to Dog Fouling. An environment warden from VWHDC has visited and posted further warning notices, and a clean up has been organised by the council. Dog owners are requested to ensure that the mess is bagged up and placed in the bin provided. The warden will be paying random visits in order to deter offenders, who can be subject to on the spot fines.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday 3rd. June in the Swallow room of rthe Village Hall, at 7.00pm. *Brian Forster. Chairman.*

The independent crime-fighting charity Crimestoppers is urging the public to tackle the issue of illegal tobacco in Thames Valley.

In partnership with Trading Standards offices across Buckinghamshire, Berkshire, Milton Keynes and Oxfordshire the public is being urged to visit www.crimestoppers-uk.org/itsadrag and recognise the damage that sales of illegal tobacco have on their local communities.

Radio, posters, leaflets and Facebook advertising have been used to inform the public to contact the charity if they have any information or suspicions on who or where illegal rolling tobacco and cigarettes are being sold. "Illegal tobacco sales can be easily overlooked and considered no more than holiday makers 'doing someone a favour'. Everyone loves a bargain but the sale of illegal tobacco can have a knock-on cost to our local communities," comments Phil Gomm, Chair for Thames Valley Crimestoppers.

"Sales are generally associated with crimes of smuggled and counterfeit tobacco and often linked with serious organised crime gangs. It can also bring our young people into early contact with criminals."

Trading Standards in Thames Valley are determined to crack down on traders of illegal tobacco but they need information from the public if they are to be successful. They recognise that often people know what is happening in their communities but are too scared to speak out to the authorities.

Crimestoppers offers people an anonymous and safe route to inform on the criminals involved in illegal tobacco sales. Where are they trading? Who are they? Do you think you know where the tobacco is being stored or made?

LONGWORTH AND DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The Book Launch and Exhibition of memorabilia on Sunday 12th May was an enjoyable and successful event. More than 100 people were encouraged into the hall by our own living Scarecrow. Many bought a book as well. A Story of Longworth, a Stonemason and his family, by Jan Kelly tells the tale of a Longworth family during 4 generations from their collected memorabilia through both World Wars, and everyday life in a small village. The book tells of the routines of this family living and working in their community. It is illustrated with family photographs, which include other residents of Longworth, family letters, official documents, wedding certificate, ration books, and National Health Cards. If you missed the launch and exhibition and would like to buy a book there is another opportunity at The Big Lunch in Longworth 2nd June, otherwise please ring me. Our walk at Coleshill Estate was guided by Bill King, who has spoken to us many times on different local aspects of World War II. At Coleshill he researches the part the Estate played in the training of the British Resistance or the Auxilliars and its part during World War II. We went into the original Operational Bunker used by the Auxilliars. The entrance was by ladder, and there was an escape exit by tunnel into the undergrowth of the grounds. The bunker would have been used by a cell of six people who worked independently and in complete isolation from other groups. A replica bunker has been made which allows visitors easier and safer access, but still gives the experience of being underground. Coleshill was the home farm of the Earl of Radnor's Coleshill Estate and was originally built as a Model farm in 1854.

22nd June we are meeting at 10.00am in Burford in the car park at the bottom of the hill at the end of Church Lane. We will be taken on a walk, by David Clark looking at houses from different periods of architecture. You may remember he gave us an interesting talk on his research on The Buildings in Burford. therefore produced this guide ,which underlines the importance of dignity, mutual respect and partnership between patients and their doctor. It also sets out the duties of the doctor and that all doctors need to be honest and open if things go wrong, and to make the care of patients their first concern.

I've also received information from Thames Valley Police about how they have been performing locally: it's good news. Across South Oxfordshire and the Vale of the White Horse, violent crime has reduced by 15.6%. Detection rates are going up: for dwelling burglary by 27.5%, for serious sexual offences by 30.3% and for

violence against the person with injury by 47.4%, and overall crime is at its lowest level for 15 years. We are lucky to live in a part of the country with relatively low crime rates (the Vale of the White Horse was recently reported as one of the 20 most peaceful areas in the UK) but every crime committed has a huge impact on its victims, while every crime solved reassures us all about the efforts of our police force. I am very pleased indeed to see these results, which are part of a pattern of reducing crime levels over a number of years. The Heritage Lottery Fund has contacted me with information about Heritage Enterprise, a new £125million grant programme specifically designed to stimulate local economic growth, generate new commercial income along with new jobs and skills by unlocking the latent commercial potential of unused historic buildings and sites across the UK. There are grants available from £100,000 to £5m. You can find out more about how your community could benefit from Heritage Enterprise by visiting their website; HLF is also offering start-up grants between \pounds 3,000 and \pounds 10,000. These grants will enable groups to create the organisational structures needed to deliver projects and to help with the associated costs, such as obtaining professional and legal advice. This month's mailbox has been largely dominated by issues relating to animal welfare. People are concerned over the exports of living animals, and sentencing for those who commit acts of cruelty. Other issues that I have seen in my mailbox include support for Amnesty International's campaign to improve women's rights in Afghanistan, which is still an essential part of the UK's foreign policy priorities, and the Government's reforms to teachers' pay and pensions.

POLICE UPDATE Faringdon East - May 2013

Welcome to May's Faringdon East Neighbourhood update from APS Louise Williams, PC Hannah Farrell and PCSO's Myra Harvey and Sue Haynes.

On 4th April a number of boats were broken into on the A415 out towards Witney. Several occurred overnight and nothing was taken on any occasion. If you do have any information about these offences please call us on telephone number 101.

On 11th April we arrested three people for theft of scrap metal from Blandy Avenue in Southmoor. This was called in by a vigilant member of the public who spotted the vehicle in the area and called this in. We encourage everyone to phone in anything they feel may be a concern on 101 or 999 if this is a crime in progress.

On 14th April there was a theft of number plates in Buckland. Two offenders have been arrested for the offence and are currently on bail.

On 17th April we had a theft of some disc cutters which were stolen from a vehicle in Stanford in the Vale. The lock had been forced and the disc cutters were the only item removed. If anyone was in the Hunters Field area and noticed anything suspicious please contact us on 101.

On 20th April we had a Burglary non dwelling where a flat screen TV was removed from a summerhouse and an attempted Burglary from another outbuilding again in Stanford in the Vale. If anyone has any information please contact us on 101.

Young people still seem to be congregating on the forecourt and a considerable amount of damage was caused to a brand new car. I would ask that if you have children/ teenagers that use the forecourt that you discourage this as we are receiving more and more complaints about this and the ASB that it causes for the neighbours and the garage. They are consistently removing litter from the site and paying for the damage caused.

We had a fantastic result in Littleworth village with the crime prevention door to door event carried out in February. A large percentage of the village is now SMARTWATERED and a sign has been placed at the beginning and the end of the village due to the amount of SMARTWATER sold. If you have not had a chance to purchase some please contact the Neighbourhood Team on 101. We are still offering free surveys for home owners as well so please contact us now if you wish to have one. We are still recruiting for the Neighbourhood Watch as well so if you would like more information please get in touch.

I would like to take this opportunity to reassure you that you live in a safe low crime area and if you need any help or assistance in any way including crime prevention advice please do not hesitate to contact me or a member of the Neighbourhood Team who will be more than happy to assist. 
