



It is almost two years since we kicked off our Raise the Roof fundraising campaign and a lot has happened since then.We have raised almost £30,000 towards the repairs to our bell tower and

most of that has come from the village so a big thank you. Raising this money has helped us get through the first round of the Heritage Lottery Fund grant application process and we have been awarded an initial grant of £4,500 to produce detailed drawings and enable us to go out to tender. This, however, still does not guarantee that we will get through to the final stage, but if we do we will get a further grant of around £30,000.

The HLF will also help us to explore the heritage of the church and with the help of the History Society we plan to research it's history, as well as collaborating with the school to produce an educational pack and forge stronger links with Kingston Bagpuize House. In the meantime we have to raise more funds in order to get through the next stage of the grant process, but it's only £5,000 which is not as daunting as the  $\pounds75,000$  we set our sights on at the beginning. We will be holding more events over the next year.

**KBS REMEMBRANCE.** On Sunday, 10th November, 2013,

we will be remembering all who, down the ages have laid down their lives for our freedoms. In particular, we will be honouring -- our 10 local men who were killed in WWI & II

- the 14 men who died as the crews of 8 aeroplanes that crashed on top of and around our village, in WWII, including 3 Americans and 3 Canadians.

- the American Service Personnel who were based in our village up until the Normandy invasion, in 1944

- those who have served and died for our freedom, since WWII. *Our remembrance will be led by the Reverend David Pickering, starting* in St John's church at 10 am. At around 10.45, the congregation will process across to the Memorial Crescent for the formal Act of Remembrance, reading of the Roll of Honour, and the Last Post & Silence. Wreaths will be placed by each stone, in turn, by a Deputy Lord Lieutenant on behalf of The *Queen, by a Serving Soldier, by the* Chairman of the Parish Council, by our Scouts & Guides and by a Senior Citizen. Our Union flag will fly alongside the Stars and Stripes and Maple Leaf flags. Towards the end of our Act of Remembrance around the stones. Stan Webb will lead us in singing 'Abide with Me'.

As we are now approaching the first anniversary of the Localism Act, it's worth remembering the range of powers and programmes which communities can use to shape their areas. The Government has published a guide which can be accessed at this website:www.gov.uk/government/publications/youve-got-the-power-a-quick-andsimple-guide-to-community-rights

It's described as quick and simple, and as it runs to just 23 pages it is a model of brevity compared to many documents produced by civil servants. There's concise guidance on the options that might be available in different sets of circumstances and then advice on what each process will involve as well as examples of how each of the powers has been used by a different community. It's well worth a look.

The current contract for the X15 expires on Saturday 31 May 2014. A review of the service has begun which includes a public consultation. Comments and ideas generated by the consultation will be considered when preparing the new tenders.

The subsidy cost for many of these contracts has doubled since RH entered administration in October 2012, and this coupled with sparse use in many cases means that some frequency reductions and/or service withdrawals are likely following the review and re-tender of these routes.

Local residents can contribute their own views via the 'Respond to a Consultation' link on the home page of the Oxfordshire website (www.oxfordshire.gov.uk). In view of the likely reduction in the X15 service it would be most helpful to indicate which journeys on the current timetable you value the most. Responses must be received by Friday 15 November 2013.

## Superfast Broadband Where and When?



The place is certainly busier than I remember but a choice of tables was still available and we were well looked after by the very pleasant Tasha, who came all the way from Stanford-in-the-Vale, doubling up as barmaid/waitress.

With after-work drinkers, young fellas around the billiard table and smokers huddled under the outside shelter, it was all

happening in the pub especially as it was only just after 6pm. As a personal aside the music didn't do it for me, but someone must have liked it.

The menu is standard pub fare and not being over hungry the bride and I shared a stuffed mushroom starter and very tasty it was too. The dish was well presented sitting on a bed of fresh lettuce and topped with a creamy cheesy sauce.

My favourite pub food is home-made steak pie and this featured on the menu and therefore in due course on my plate. When it arrived I was amazed at the size of the portion of fries and indeed the size of pie would have done justice to Desperate Dan. The meat in the Steak-in-Guinness pie was extremely tender and melted in the mouth, as did the puff pastry topping. However I could have done with a tad more gravy but this did not detract from the tasty dish. My vegetarian bride had the cod and chips and reported it was fine with no bones and little skin. Praise indeed.

So, with a couple of pints and an orange juice, one starter, two very good main meals and a bill of £25 in a pub within walking distance. What's not to like? Eton Loveitt

#### To the KBS News.....

I'm sorry your Editor feels "the ability to write funny situation comedies for the BBC seems to have passed us by". (Editor's Blog Oct Edition KBS News).

As someone who has worked in TV and Radio comedy since 1979 I'd make a few points.

I. Sitcom writing is pretty difficult. You have to do all the things dramas do (create original and fascinating characters, put them in testing situations and, ensure every scene carries the story forward through telling action and dialogue) PLUS generate a laugh roughly every 15 seconds. Sadly for comedy writers "a laugh a minute" isn't good enough.

2. On the main channels (BBC One especially) you try to appeal to as big an audience as possible (60 and 70 somethings as well as 20 and 30 somethings. Even 90 somethings like my KBS resident mother-in-law). The reason is very simple - if you don't get enough viewers your show is axed. When my first sitcom (An Actor's Life for me) transferred from Radio to BBC One I spent sleepless nights worrying about the ratings. They held steady for the first five weeks then dropped for the last episode. As a result, the show was not recommissioned and I was effectively made redundant with no severance pay.

3. Sitcoms don't tend to get everything right in the first episode or even the first series. The writer(s) and cast need time to gel and time to get to know the characters.

4.Viewers also need time to develop a fondness for a show. Ratings for the first series of Fawlty Towers were shockingly low. "Only Fools and Horses" was going to be axed after the first series then a gap appeared elsewhere in the schedules so it was repeated and did much better. In 1968 a producer was told to play a pilot he'd made to focus groups (they had them even then) to see if it should be broadcast. The response from the focus groups was so negative he kept it quiet and persuaded his bosses to commission a series anyway. Lucky he did because otherwise we would never have seen "Dad's Army".

5. Your editor hated the new sitcom "Count Arthur Strong". It made me hoot with laughter. Does that mean I'm an idiot or your editor has no sense of humour? Nope. It just means that sometimes different things make us laugh. The problem is that if we hear an audience laugh at something we don't find funny we take it very personally indeed because having a sense of humour is something we take very seriously. That is why comedy programmes are both loved and loathed more than any other genre. I have had the good fortune to work on a couple of big hits - "The Vicar of Dibley" and "Mrs Brown's Boys" - and although they are much loved I've met people who detest them with such a fervour it is as if I've committed a war crime.

So are there any funny BBC sitcoms around? Well, personally I think "Mrs Brown" is very funny. And "Count Arthur". And "Miranda". And "The Wrong Mans". And "The Thick of It". And "Outnumbered". And "Rev". And "Twenty Twelve" (which is returning even though the Olympics are gone). But others will disagree. Above all, I am genuinely sorry that every sitcom doesn't make everyone laugh because laughter is such a wonderful thing. Finally, I agree with your editor in his love for the American Classics 'Everybody Loves Raymond" and "Frasier". Arguably the finest sitcom in the world at the moment is the one from the Frasier team - "Modern Family". I also read with interest about The John Blandy School's splendid 'Roald Dahl Day'. My Dibley co-writer, Richard Curtis, and I have just adapted Roald Dahl's story 'Esio Trot' for TV. If all goes according to plan we start filming with Dustin Hoffman and Judi Dench next April and it will be on BBC One over Christmas 2014. Something, we hope, for all the family. Fingers crossed it gets decent ratings! Best wishes **Paul Mayhew-Archer.** Well that tells me, if anybody wants me I'll be in my bunker. Ed.

## LONGWORTH AND DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The last summer visit of this year was to Ditchley, an 18th century mansion set in beautiful parkland near Charlbury. We were shown around by Chris Galloway, who told us of the history of the Lee family who had bought the land and an existing building in 1580 to the present house which was built 1722. A visit to Ditchley by Queen Elizabeth 1 is commemorated by a portrait by Marcus Gheeraerts, this painting now hangs in the National Portrait Gallery. It continued to be a family home until the death of the 17th Viscount Dillon in 1932 when death duties forced the family to sell the house and land. It was bought in 1933 by an American Mr Ronald Tree, who was responsible for bringing the house and gardens up to their present high standard. It was during this time that Winston Churchill, and other high profile members of the government visited. In 1958 David Wills set up The Ditchley Foundation, which supports the transatlantic link through holding conferences on any issues of interest to those on both sides of the Ocean. A most interesting place to visit.

Caroline Jackson spoke to us in October about the expansion of the British Empire on the Eastern Cape of South Africa known as 'The Kaffir Wars'. This was after the discovery of the Diaries of General Primrose 1819-1892, in a manor house in Oxfordshire. This is a story of the part of the military career of General Primrose. He is commemorated by a statue of a large lion in a park in Reading.

The next meeting in Southmoor Village Hall is on 21st November. Richard O Smith will give us 'The Alternative Tour of Oxford'. Richard is an author, Oxford Times columnist, and writer for Radio 4 The Now Show. It is time to buy tickets for our Christmas Meeting on December 6th. 
## KINGSTON BAGPUIZE DRAMA GROUP

## **NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL**

The October meeting of the KBS Parish Council was held on Monday 7th October in the Village Hall, together with 4 members of the public.

**Public Participation.** Mrs Grant gave an update on the latest application for a number of dwellings (now 22) and a replacement sports pavilion and pitch facilities. An earlier application for 12 dwellings may be refused given the relatively low density, and absence of affordable housing.

Mr. Belcher explained the background to his recent Planning Application, submitted in response to a visit from a VWHDC planning Enforcement officer.

The Chair recognised that the Parish Council's objection was in error in claiming that there was not a "Portakabin" on site. Mr Belcher accepted that the use of the word "Canteen" in the application, vastly overstated the proposal for a rest room to accommodate a small number of people.

**Naming of new road/properties** Beggars Lane/Faringdon Rd. The Parish Council's suggestion for the road, Harrowdown Place, and the two houses fronting Faringdon Road, Blackmore and Howe House have been adopted.

Reports from District and County Councillor. Apologies received from Mrs Tilley for her absence!

**Planning**. A resident had contacted the Chairman to seek support for the designation of a conservation area to include the historic properties in Town Pond Lane. Members supported the proposal in principle and will consider a Parish Council led proposal. The Clerk will seek further advice on the process of establishing these areas.

Several Council members and representatives of the Village Hall Management Committee had met with Mr. Cattermole (Taylor Wimpey) to discuss progress on the Draycott Rd. development. Taylor Wimpey envisages a start date of Jan 2014 with completion expected in 2.5 years The Parish Council confirmed it's decision to acquire the land in the south east corner adjacent to the tennis courts.

The council will accept a diversion to the existing route of the dedicated footpath if part of the open space within the completed development can/could be fenced so that dog walkers could release their dogs from the lead.

Applications Received. Please refer to PC October minutes.

Accounts: The charges for weekly collection will increase substantially from 1st. October. The PC agreed to accept the revised annual charge of £964+vat. Alternatives to the VWHDC contractor will be investigated.

Donations. A donation of £100 to South and Vale Carers Centre approved.

The balance of the Information Technology fund (£250 prize Money from some years ago) was requested to be donated to kbs-on-line to support the group in maintaining the WIFi connection to the Village Hall. Approved.

**Payments.** A total of £4718.31 was expended in Sept. including £498 in repairs to the bus shelter subsequent to the vandalism suffered to same.

**Correspondence**. VWHDC Community governance review. Suggested that a proposal to extend the Parish Boundary to include the whole of the area of Frilford Parish south of the A415 be included in the forthcoming consultation.

OCC Review of Witney area bus services, including X15, Public consultation will continue until 15th Nov, tender docs. will then be prepared to provide services from 1st. June2014. Residents who use the services are urged to respond to the

consultation identifying the services they value most, any changes, and or improvements they would wish to see introduced . Also to lobby our District and County Councillor in order to retain the service.

OCC Highways A34 closures. Carriageway closures between A4130 Milton interchange and M4 junction 13 will take place over night and at weekends between Mon 28th Oct. and Monday 25th Nov. (full details from Parish Clerk)

**Proposed New speed limit Faringdon Road**. A consultation on the Parish Council's proposal to extend the 30mph speed limit throughout the existing 40mph limit will last until the 1st Nov. Those residents who have complained in the past, regarding excessive speed on this stretch of the Faringdon Road, are urged to support the proposal via the website or in writing to O.C.C. Highways.

Village Amenities. Recreation grounds. Repairs to be undertaken to Football pitch.

**War Memorial**. Wreaths will be supplied by the Parish Council. The flag poles will be erected for a number of days prior to Remembrance Day.

**Faults.** The gate to the A420 on Draycott road requires repair. Vegetation from residential properties overhanging the pathway creates a hazard pedestrians in some areas, owners are reminded that they could be liable if injuries occur. Subsequent to recent sewage blockage on the Blandy Estate, Thames Water will be asked what action is proposed to prevent a recurrence of these problems. A number of surface water drains are partially blocked, and need attention before the onset of winter.

The next meeting of the Parish Council, will be on Monday 4th November, in the Village Hall at 7 p.m. All are welcome. *Brian Forster. Chair KBS Parish Council.*

15th June – we had an early start to make our way back to Lower Foxhangers dealing with over 7 locks and 4 swing bridges plus an increase of traffic on the canal. The disadvantage to our boat was that it had a large beam, and therefore it was impossible to share a lock with any other boat. In addition the weather had not always been in our favour. 3 days of very strong winds not only made the boat difficult to steer, but reminded John how similar it was to a sailing boat. We made it to Bridge 149, and moored up. It was pouring with rain. We had lunch at the 3 Magpies Public House, and Richard had contacted Gordon to pick us up. After the meal, paid for by Didcot Rotary Club, we embarked on the last leg of our journey whilst the passengers cleaned the boat, and there on the marina was Gordon to greet us. The boat was moored and secured, and we said farewell to Ann and Janice and their charges. Richard and John were impressed by the dedication, empathy, love and warmth and being firm when necessary shown to their charges by Ann and Janice.

So 3 men and a boat ended up as 2 men and a boat – was it worth it? The hours were long – sleep was short (so were the bunks) - the Style Acres endured wet and windy weather as did Richard John and Alan on the odd occasion! Arms, legs, ankles, knees, aching and swollen, walking zombies comes to mind. YES. The Diana was



the 4th boat to join the fleet in 1988 - has a large foredeck and sliding sun roof. She can accommodate up to ten people: four in wide berths at the front and six in bunks in the rear compartments - the bottom bunks are lowlevel for easier access. She has a fully equipped galley with cooker and fridge, central heating, an airing cupboard, two flushing, specially-fitted WCs and a

hydraulic lift down into the boat and internal steps or another hydraulic lift to the foredeck. John Smith

specially-fitted shower. She has wide-access ramps for boarding at the stern deck and a


