A year on - we say..... John Blandy is a Good School!



It has been a busy first term for all at John Blandy with four new teachers to get to know and lots of new children to settle in! We have had our exam results through and we have made excellent progress over the last academic year. Most significantly is the percentage of children leaving Reception with a Good Level of Development which in 2014 was 75%, up from 19% in 2013! At the other end of the school, in Year Six, the children did brilliantly in their SATs. We were above the national average of attaining level 5 (above age related expectations) in Reading, Maths and Spelling Punctuation and Grammar. Well done to all the children and the staff!

We started this year with the grand unveiling of our new classroom (the old ICT room!). It is wonderful to have single year groups in each class, and to have such small classes in the older years. We have also been busy fundraising this term, with events raising funds for type one diabetes, Dahl's Children's charity and Macmillan, as well as events to raise funds for the school such as the film night and the Halloween disco which will be held later this week.

We celebrated 'Dahlicious Day' on the 26th September in style; coming to school dressed as our favourite Roald
Dahl characters in
aid of the Dahl
Children's Charity.
Not only did we have
a good day, but we raised

£152.00 for poorly children too!



Also on the 26th September, we held a Macmillan coffee morning. Mums and Dads stayed for tea and cake after the morning drop off, and the Year Six children set up and ran a cake shop at break time. The combined efforts resulted in £241.07 being raised for Macmillan- thank you to all that supported this event. Just last week we all came to school in our onesies and pyjamas to raise awareness and funds for type one diabetes. One of the children has type one diabetes and she wrote me a letter requesting we hold a 'type onesie day' to help her friends understand her condition and raise funds to help find a cure. How could I refuse! This was a very successful event (amount raised TBC) and a lot of fun to come to school in our onesies!

As we draw a close to the first term, we are also reflecting on our one year anniversary since our inspection. We welcomed an Ofsted team into school on the 22nd and 23rd October 2013, and they found the school to be 'Requiring Improvement'. We have all worked incredibly hard over the last twelve months, and I am thrilled to announce that we now judge ourselves to be Good in all areas against the new Ofsted framework. This is a significant achievement and one which we are all extremely proud of. I would like to say thank you to the staff, parents, governors and most importantly our children for their enthusiasm, hard work and commitment to the school and the high quality education it provides.



The 'On the Buses' debate continues from last month.....

I think they are missing the point. The signs in bus shelters must be the expensive part - i.e. to make them link to the internet and give them power to work. But for people in a village like yours they are not really needed. I can see the point in a town where if a bus is running 15 minutes late you can maybe do some extra shopping, have a cup of coffee, decide to take another bus or take a taxi. In KB what benefit is it to come to a bus stop and find the bus is late and all you can do is wait. There are not many alternatives you can take.

When I used the 66 bus it had wifi access and so the buses are connected to the internet. So the bus can already pass real time details to Oxon times or stagecoach web sites. On my phone or on the sat nav in my car I know exactly where I am and so to put that on a bus could only cost a very small £100. So link that to the internet and they know where the 66 buses are.

The real benefit I saw when I was in the village was that with the buses linked to oxon times for very low cost then you could check your phone or computer and then leave the house at the right time. i.e. in winter when it is cold you could see that the bus was 10 minutes late and so leave the house later and only have a couple of minutes in the cold or rain before the bus arrived. It would make the bus more like a taxi and encourage more use! Considering the cheap cost (i.e. without putting the signs in the shelters) it seems crazy that the bus company does not do it! *Name & address supplied.*

Our Parish Transport Representative, Ian Charlton, replies...All I can say in answer is that in October of last year the County Council's Public Transport Officer stated that Real time information on rural routes (which included the A420) ' would be too costly to install'. This has since been reiterated as has the fact that the Stagecoach buses on the 66 route are NOT equipped for RTI and will not be until well into 2015.

Can anyone say what will happen to our existing Scout HQ, if a new one is built? I do hope it's not going to be demolished! It would be such a shame if it is, as it's part of our village history! Also, what's happened to our Log Cabin? Am I the only one who would much prefer a decent newsagents, rather than a smelly fast food place! Which I'm sure is only adding to the traffic chaos by the shops! Name & Address supplied

ROAD CLOSURE

Due to drainage soakaway works, part of Blandy Avenue will be closed from November 3rd for three weeks.

The effect of the order, when appropriate traffic signs are displayed, is to prohibit any vehicle from using that part of Blandy Avenue from outside No.10 Blandy Avenue to its junction with Larch Close.

Exemptions are included for emergency services and for the works. The alternative route is via the crescent of Blandy Avenue. This order will remain in force for a maximum period of eighteen months or until the works have been completed whichever is the sooner.

FEEL LIKE EATING OUT TONIGHT? No: 20 Star Inn, Sparsholt, Nr Wantage.

Oh dear, oh dear, where to start. The evening began well with four of us taking an evening drive to the village of Sparsholt, somewhere I had never visited before.

On entering the Star Inn, everything looked right. Beautifully decorated, tables nicely laid out, all looked like efficiency itself. Our pre-meal drinks were served and the menu perused. So far so good. The first thing to notice? The practice of cranking up the prices by

having usual dishes that accompany a meal as extras. An idea that is becoming more and more popular it seems, though not with the customers I fancy.

We skipped the starters, as there was little choice for the vegetarian bride and went straight for the main course. I chose the dressed cod, £18.95 for the fish and an extra £3 for half a dozen chips. See where this is going? We sat down at 8pm and the food duly arrived just before 9 o'clock! In fairness everyone enjoyed their food and my cod was delicious, but having said that I was still very hungry. The bride had the risotto which portion wise resembled a starter, then my plate was removed before the rest of the party had finished, Tut Tut.

Filling up on bread rolls wasn't the way I planned to spend a gourmet Saturday night but hey perhaps the puddings would make up for it. The White Crème Brulee beckoned all four of us from the menu. What's this only one portion left? OK these things happen, so being the gentleman I had the cheese. Four portions of cheese, a few biscuits and chutneys - excellent.

Another of our party had to ask for a knife for her cheesecake, and by now our napkins had been removed so they had to be replaced, golly this is fun.

Enough, The bill was requested and came to over £174. This is for four main courses and puddings and two bottles of wine at £18 each. Wow! It was then noticed they had charged for a third bottle of wine we never had, that reduced the damage to £156.

Calling a senior member of staff, very pleasant chap, the failings of the evening were discussed and he did reduce the bill by £30. Quite right. This outcome wasn't the intention of the complaint but he handled it skilfully and it went someway to repairing the damaged evening.

The Star Inn was a disappointment and on the value-for-money scale I thought expensive with the starters kicking off at £8-£9 (although the soup was £5.95). True the staff were friendly and courteous but the wait for the meal was totally unacceptable. *Eton Lovett*.

With September this year having been the driest on record, it remains to be seen if the plan has worked. In response to the question of how long the encampment on the corner of Bellamy Close will be in place, the answer was hopefully up until April next year or even 12 months from now.

Ist Southmoor Guides



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Ron's Green Gardening Tips for November

If you have grown pumpkins, winter squashes and marrows this year leave the plant for as long as possible this will ensure the best flavour, but cut and remove before any frost occurs. These should then be 'cured' in a warm place for about two weeks to allow the outer skin to harden. Afterwards

they can be stored in a dry frost-free place until they are needed for cooking, delicious roasted or boiled with a knob of butter. Remember when storing vegetables do check them regularly, especially onions for softness and neck rot. This month you can sow broad beans outdoors for an early crop in May or June next year when these plants are less likely to attract black fly in the spring. Also, prepare the beds for growing onion sets.

November is usually the best month for planting most varieties of fruit whilst the soil is still warm to enable the roots to establish themselves before winter. Select the position for planting and prepare the hole immediately before planting ensuring plenty of room for the roots. Work-in a generous helping of well-rotted compost (homemade if you have it) add a sprinkling of root fertilizer and water well, heel in with top soil then add a top layer of compost to retain the moisture and suppress weeds. Stake the plant if necessary, prune to shape, and remove any damaged branches.

Garden ponds; these are not only an attractive feature but also attract birds and wild creatures to the garden. To keep your pond in good condition thin out some of the underwater oxygenating plants and any underwater decayed vegetation. Remove old water lily leaves and protect the surface from falling leaves by covering the complete surface area with small-mesh netting. This is best stretched over a frame, which can be easily lifted to remove the gathered leaves. Whilst removing debris this also gives an opportunity to remove the submersible pump to clean and store away safely ready for next spring. There is no need to feed fish in the pond when the days become colder.

My favourite vegetable of the month is Beetroot delicious roasted, boiled or even pickled. Easy to grow from seed in March and ready to harvest late summer or autumn.

KINGSTON BAGPUIZE DRAMA GROUP

After lots of hard work the drama group is really looking forward to presenting 'Kindertransport' at the end of this month. Rehearsals have gone well, the set has been built, and our technical team led by Ian Ashby, has risen to the lighting and sound challenges this production presents.

The play alternates swiftly between the late 1930s and 1980s with varying locations. These include two completely different domestic settings and

additionally a train station, train carriage and on board a boat. This means that lighting and sound are critical to evoking a sense of time and place and we couldn't have contemplated this production without such a committed technical

crew.

Period props and costumes have also had to be sourced, so for the past few months we have been scouring attics, charity shops and e-bay to find the right items for as little money as possible. We are lucky to have access to The Oxfordshire Drama Wardrobe, an amazing resource that has been supplying costumes for amateur productions since before World War II. Anything we have been unable to find from their collection of 6000 items has been made by members of the group.

'Kindertransport', examines the life, during World War II and afterwards, of a Kindertransport child. The central character 'Eva' is played by Ruby Belcher, a Year 9 student who is acting with KBDG for the first time. The role of Eva presents several challenges, as the actress playing her needs to be able to portray the character between the ages of 12 and 17, speak English with a German accent and then later with a northern accent, occasionally speak in German as well as sing and play the harmonica. All this on top of the 'run of the mill' remembering of lines and moves. The picture shows Ruby in rehearsal.

'Kindertransport' is currently a GCSE Drama text so our production may also be of interest to anybody currently studying drama at school, and is suitable for Y6 upwards.

Performance dates are 27-29th November at the village hall. Tickets will be available to purchase in the village, via wegottickets.com or by calling 01865 736913 or by turning up on the night. We would advise pre-booking by phone as we have already sold a number of seats for each night. We will have a fully licensed bar and will also be serving teas and coffees. A word of caution with the increasing vehicle movements using this busy junction at peak times from Draycott Wood plus school runs, and the shortly to be occupied new homes off Draycott Road are such scenes likely to be a more common occurrence?



The October meeting of the KBS Parish Council took place on Monday 6th October in the Village Hall, together with Melinda Tilley (District & County Clr.) Mr. R. Harvey (Thames Water) plus other engineers and 15 members of the Public.

Mr. Harvey explained that plans have yet to be finalised to resolve the current foul water blockages, and at the same time provide for the Witney Road 'development'. A replacement sewer through Bellamy Close/Norwood Avenue is currently proposed, with a larger bore in certain sections. The likely completion date is currently forecast for April 2015, some 12 months from the start of the additional pumping! Surveys have shown that at least two sections of sewer have either collapsed or disintegrated, particularly down the School path, which will require full excavation and possible closure for a period, together with re-connection to the main sewer in the Faringdon Road. Members of the public who have experienced overflows and contamination of their property, demanded the installation of a high level float alarm; notwithstanding the provision of a watchman who is positioned at the pump in the Faringdon Road 24/7, who had failed to spot pump failure; which resulted in flooding on the previous occasion. Information will be obtained on the capacity of the existing Sewage Works, and whether an increase in capacity will be required to meet the additional demand once the current developments are occupied, let alone the further proposals that are coming forward! It was also agreed to report on the apparent change of route of the sewer connection from the Draycott Road site towards Beggars Lane and any potential environmental impact of the current pumping of surface water from this site. Members of the public raised their concerns regarding the impact of current and future developments on local infrastructure. The proposal for a Strategic Site for 280 dwellings, north of the Oxford Road, is of special concern.

The recent consultation by David Wilson Homes, who plan 80 dwellings, north of Field Close, was criticised for its failure to address issues, including John Blandy Primary School being full by Sept 2015, or earlier. Report from District & County Councillor: Mrs Tilley agreed to investigate the apparent disproportionate demands by the VWHDC for S106 funding on the sports field development to the detriment of the football and cricket clubs; and to identify a Road Safety Officer within OCC to attend a future meeting in order to address local concerns. Planning: Two received, both for extensions. For full details, please refer to October minutes. Decisions: One Received. Granted. Land to rear of Eden Cottage. One dwelling. Accounts: For full details of payments, please refer to October minutes. Internal Auditor: The appointment of Arrow Consulting for 2014/15 was approved. Annual Return: The external audit has been completed, approved and accepted by the Council. The return is available for scrutiny, apply to Parish Clerk. Donations: £300 to KBS14+£100 to Oxfordshire Assoc. For the Blind were Approved. Road Safety: A public consultation document on a Zebra Crossing on the Abingdon Rd. in the Hinds Head area will be advertised, with a view to determining the best location. Costs to be born by S106 payments from David Wilson Homes, Witney Road site. The need for a crossing on the Faringdon Road close to the School will be brought to the attention of the VWHDC Planning Dept and OCC Highways, in order that costs can be met by S106 payments from one or all of forthcoming developments.

Land to be leased or purchased under S106 Agreements: **Sports field and Pavilion:** A copy of the licence agreement for signature is awaited. This will allow the S106 agreement to be finalised with the developer and the Vale. Some minor issues remain before a lease document to the Parish Council can be signed. **Land to South of Pye development:**- No further progress. **Land adjacent to Village Hall:** A further meeting to be arranged with Taylor Wimpey to discuss this and other issues. **Land off the Witney Road:**

Correspondence: OCC Review of bus services. The 63 is most unlikely to continue after May 2015, links to route 66, e.g. Community bus, will be investigated. The 66 will no longer receive a subsidy, resulting in no journeys diverting from the A420 through the smaller Villages. Council will respond regretting and objecting to loss of 66 journeys through the villages, especially the late night return from Oxford OCC Consultation on Mobile Library Service. The budget will remain unchanged but some changes are planned, users are advised to watch carefully for any degradation of the service, and voice their objections, as necessary. Village Amenities: Recreation Grounds: The memorial seat to Matt Kucinski has been installed in the large recreation ground, following a public donation. The clerk will follow up the order for the replacement See-Saw, and determine if installation can take place whilst the access gate is obstructed by the sewage pump and pipelines. Burial Ground. The boundary wall has developed further large cracks. Mr Dando, P.C.C. will monitor condition. War Memorial: A Honour guard of 18 soldiers from Dalton Barracks, Abingdon will attend the Remembrance Day service and wreath laying ceremony at the Memorial Green. Faults: The surface of the A415/A420 roundabout continues to deteriorate, as does the Faringdon Road/A415 Mini roundabout. Referred to OCC Highways, YET AGAIN! The lighting on the footpath from Fir Tree Close/School path is obscured by the tall Leylandii hedge. (It was a condition of planning consent that this hedge was to be maintained by the residents of the houses erected and bounded by this hedge)

The next meeting is on 20th November, 7.15 for 7.30pm and will be held in Southmoor Village Hall, for a talk entitled 'Steam and Steel in the Vale of the White Horse', given by Tony Hadland. Tony is a local historian and chairman of Oxfordshire Local History Association.

For our October meeting we had a lively, amusing and very informative talk by Colin Oakes on the life and times of Samuel Pepys. Pepys was a gifted diarist who left a vivid record (1½ million words, much of it in shorthand) about his life in 17th Century London. He efficiently reorganised the administration of the Navy, worked as an MP and survived living in London during periodic episodes of the plague. They had no idea of what caused the plague. London life of this era included butchering animals in the streets, multitude of rats feeding on the left overs and fleas feeding on the rats. The decaying debris was gradually washed down the centre of the road until eventually flowing into the Thames. When the rats died the fleas left in search of a new host, often a human, who could then be infected by bubonic plague. He also described the horrific fire of 1666 when so much of London was destroyed when a negligent baker didn't cover his fire one night when he went to bed. The fire spread quickly through the tightly-packed houses and also destroyed 87 churches including St Paul's Cathedral. Janet Keene





Mark Potts' Kitchen Talk

There's a brand new head chef at Fallowfields Hotel, Mark Potts. Mark has reinstated the culinary



As the nights are beginning to draw in and it gets colder I want to give a 'winter warmer' recipe. This one is using partridge. It's all cooked in one pot and is really simple to prepare. In a casserole dish put a layer of chopped root veg at the bottom (I use carrots turnips and potatoes). Season the partridge with salt and place on the vegetables. One partridge should serve two people. Pour on half a pint of dry cider and a pint of meat stock, (cube or fresh) and a bay leaf. Place in the oven at 170c for 45 minutes. Take out of the oven and remove the bird and put it onto a board. The stock and vegetables will have cooked and thickened. To finish, put it onto the stove and stir in a teaspoon of tomato puree and a teaspoon of marmite and salt and pepper. It adds flavour and helps to thicken it. It's a bit of a tip to allow the meat to rest for a few minutes. It lets the heat go through evenly and the muscles relax so it's more tender. Carve the breast and leg. Spoon over the vegetables and sauce. It's good served with crusty bread and braised cabbage. Enjoy!!

It's a great time of year for produce, seasonality is very important to the kitchen team here at Fallowfields. I'm very passionate about cooking. My happiest memory is working at Noma in Copenhagen a few years ago, fantastic chefs and amazing food!
