Have your say on the closure of recycling centres.



Oxfordshire County Council is currently inviting views on its proposals for the future provision of household waste recycling centres (HWRCs) in Oxfordshire to save £350,000 from the budget by 2017/18. The proposal is to reduce the number of HWRCs from seven to three or four, and to change the opening hours of the remaining sites. Once agreed, changes to the HWRCs will be made over several years with plenty of notice given to local residents. For residents living in Kingston Bagpuize and Southmoor this will have an affect on anyone making future trips to the recycling centres. Stanford in the Vale and Redbridge centres are included in the proposal that one and possibly both of these could close. The nearest one for our villages could become Kidlingdon (Drayton recycling centre is also at risk of closure). (Nice journey down the A420 and A34!) If anyone wants to comment on these proposals time is running out and you will find the consultation paper on the Council's public website at: https://consultations.oxfordshire.gov.uk/consu




VILLAGE VOICES 2

Our response to the refugee crisis

Since the Government has announced that the UK will take 20,000 refugees from camps in and around Syria we have been in discussions

with the County Council and other districts in Oxfordshire to prepare to play our role. The Home Office are yet to inform us as to how many, if any, refugees we will be asked to resettle. The context of the housing crisis in Oxfordshire clearly makes this particularly challenging, but once we know the scale of the challenge we will be able to plan how to respond.

Recycling

The Vale looks set to be ranked 2nd place in the country for recycling again this year. This has only been achieved thanks to the help and cooperation of residents. In an effort to improve our service, from 5th October Vale residents can also recycle small electrical goods at the kerbside. The Vale will also be responding to the County Council's consultation on Recycling Centres. OCC are reviewing these centres with a view to saving £350,000. Residents have understandable concerns about the potential closure of these tips and the knock on effect, particularly with fly-tipping. (See page one)



ED VAIZEY'S Parish Newsletter

This month I have received hundreds of emails and letters regarding the Syrian refugee crisis. The photos and accounts we have seen are shocking and harrowing, which is why we continue to be at the forefront of the international response to the humanitarian crisis in Syria – including as the

second biggest bilateral donor of humanitarian aid, having already pledged £1 billion. I know that Britain is a moral nation and we will fulfil our moral responsibilities. I have been moved by the number of people in the Wantage and Didcot constituency who have contacted me to say they would like to provide a room in their home to a refugee, and I will continue to discuss the issue with you as things progress.

Last month I wrote about the Assisted Dying Bill – and it is interesting to see that Parliament overwhelmingly voted down the measure when it was debated. I voted against the Bill.

FEEL LIKE EATING OUT TONIGHT? No: 30 The Boar's Head, Ardington

I have been trying to dine at the Boar's Head for a while now and was looking forward to my meal at this popular eating establishment. Eating out with friends is one of life's niceties and so on a fine summer's evening, four of us descended on the beautiful village of Ardington and the jewel that is the Boar's Head.

The place is popular; make no mistake. Our table awaited after our drinks order was taken at the bar by the very friendly proprietoress Doreen, who with her sister runs the restaurant. The minimalist decor is fairly typical of pub/restaurants these days. A forest of light wood and pastel shades with blinds in place of curtains, you know the kind of thing.

The menu is not available on line as it changes so often, so when the pleasant young waitress supplied the document this was our first glimpse of the fare available. The 'special' of the day was Lamb Shank. That did beckon but was being outbid by the plethora of temptations from the main menu. Oh the agony of choice. I eventually took the coward's way out and went for one of my favourite starters, Stuffed Garlic Mushrooms. Usually shown the garlic from across the room in many kitchens, here it is used liberally enough to keep the vampires away for decades. Bristling with flavour the Fresh Cap Mushrooms are stuffed with a creamy dolcelatté cheese, tomato, spinach, and of course the garlic breadcrumbs and lashings of homemade garlic butter. Served with just enough bread to soak up that oh-so-delicious butter. By this time there was no Lamb Shanks left, which made up my mind for me so I went for the homemade Beef chunks braised in Guinness and Orange in a puff pastry case. This was served with dauphinoise potatoes and fresh vegetables. What can I say? Stunning. Tender, tasty with each forkful melting in your mouth. Now as I mentioned the servings here are generous and even I couldn't manage a starter and a pud, so after casting an eye over the wide selection of desserts we called for the bill. It came to £116 for four starters and main courses to include aperitifs and a bottle of Malbec. Pretty much what you would expect for this quality of meal and service.

A superb meal and highly recommended. The only downside was the background noise exacerbated by the current fad of simple decor with no curtains and carpets to help soak up the decibels. This is probably a personal thing but is evident in many eateries today. I would encourage anyone to try the Boar's Head - if you can get in! *Eton Lovett*.

THE KBS NEWS WINE LIST: WINES OF THE MONTH



Well autumn is here and the days are getting cooler so now is the time to think of a nice wine to cheer you up.

This month we decided to recommend from a selection of Australian wines - well someone has to try them first –

apart from the very good Shiraz, we have chosen two bottles which we hope you will enjoy.

The first is the Cabernet Sauvignon from the Limestone Coast in the SE Region of Coonawarra which is synonymous for its robust red wines and in particular Cabernet Sauvignon. Nature has given the region an amazing advantage, lying on a thin strip of rich terra rossa soil over a limestone bed.

The wine is from the Aldi Exquisite Collecting and is dark with juicy fruit laden with powerful yet elegantly structured blackcurrants and black plums which add complexity and incredible length to the intense dark fruit. This 2013 wine is very reasonably priced at £6.99 from Aldi in the Botley Road.

The second choice is the Thorn-Clarke Morello Nebbiolo from the Barossa Valley; this has a red brick hue. Lifted complex nose, with raspberry, tarry, with some figs and cedary notes. The palate is light-medium bodied and in the savoury spectrum with meaty characters and some Kallamata olives. The palate is quite rounded with soft approachable tannins and good persistence. This 2011 vintage had a cool, slow ripening period which has in turn produced elegant red wines, aged for 24 months in old oak barrels the palate is typically Nebbiolo. The wine perhaps priced a little above the usual is £12.99 from the Oxford Wine Company also in the Botley Road.

The Wine Quartet is taking a sabbatical in November in order to find some wines worthy of the Christmas period. Cheers, *The Wine Quartet*

KINGSTON BAGPUIZE DRAMA GROUP





Carnivorous plants

October is a good time to think about your lawn. If you're a dutiful mower, the mowing season will be drawing to a close now, and the height of cut



should be raised by up to 2-3 cm (1 in) to allow the grass to build up strength for the

winter. You should consider scarifying; this is a hard raking to rid of the old dead grass, moss and rubbish that has collected there during the summer. Unremoved, these form a waterproof thatch on top of the soil that prevent rain from reaching the roots. If you have a small lawn then hand-raking is a good energetic job for a cool October day. If you have a larger lawn, it is best to use an electric scarifier!



NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

The September meeting of the KBS Parish Council took place on Monday 7th September in the Village Hall, together with 15 members of the public, and District Councillor Mr Eric

Batts

The Chairman, on behalf of the Parish Council, expressed condolences to the family of Mr. Rodney Attewell of Aston, who had been taken ill and died whilst attending an indoor sports activity at the Village Hall. Public Participation: Speedwatch. Sufficient funding has now been achieved, by local villages, to enable the purchase of a speed camera which will be manned by local volunteers, again from local villages, in an attempt to reduce the incidence of speeding through the villages, which is giving cause for concern. Offenders will receive cautionary letters in the first instance, and only repeat offenders will receive a summons, from Thames Valley Police.

The condition of the Footway to the East of the Witney Rd, subsequent to utility excavation, was raised, in that restoration is somewhat inadequate and difficult for residents who are wheelchair users. The relevant utilities will be contacted.

As part of the Southmoor Grange Development, Taylor Wimpey, has agreed, to construct a retaining wall alongside the new footpath adjacent to the Village Hall, together with a formal entrance, comprising of Dry Stone walling, to the village hall roadway. Taylor Wimpey also agreed to the initial maintenance of the footpath right of way between Draycott Rd. and the Bridleway Bridge. The Footpath has received some hedge trimming but still needs levelling, and despite numerous promises, no work has yet commenced on the retaining wall, and the formal entrance. T.W. to be contacted.

General complaints were made regarding overhanging vegetation to footways and roads, lampposts etc. Residents are reminded of their responsibilities in this regard, where the plant originates from their property. Reports from District and County Councillors: District Councillor, Eric Batts advised that VOWHDC will soon be collecting small electrical items and rags (not recyclable clothes) from the roadside. These items to be placed alongside the Grey Bin, and rags in a plastic bag. Start date to be advised.

The first phase of the local plan has been submitted to the local inspector, and the result should be announced in the New Year. A second stage will follow.

A dispute has arisen over S106 monies (from the Taylor.Wimpey site) as agreed to be distributed; at a meeting in November of last year, and as now being advised by Anna Robinson, VOWHDC Strategic Director for planning. The Parish Council does not accept the position as advised, as it severely disadvantages a number of Village sporting organisations and facilities. Eric Batts is currently investigating and is to report back. The situation with regard to a "Parcour" resulted in a lively discussion. The situation is as it has been, since the inception of the idea, in that a suitable site, agreeable to both residents and the supporters of the activity has yet to be identified.

County Councillor, Mrs. Melinda Tilley reported that the County Council is currently consulting on a number of Budget proposals: - Particularly, Subsidised buses, Recycling Centre Closures (Opposed by VOWHDC), Children's Centre Closures (opposed by many) Library and Museums. This is all driven by the Central Government requirement to make savings of £60M from the budget and that is before a further spending review in November. The wholesale reduction / destruction of services and facilities is madness, when tens of thousands of new houses are proposed and already being built and the relevant population increase is under way. (Chair)

Planning: For planning applications and decisions and comments / observations, please refer to PC minutes, as the information contained therein is too extensive for this article.

Village amenities: Recreation Grounds. A number of maintenance tasks are required, including replacement of all the Goal nets. Burial Ground. The acquisition of a garden waste bin has been approved for the burial ground, in order to remove used floral tributes more easily.

War Memorial. Invitations have been extended to Dalton Barracks, Abingdon, to the Lord Lieutenant's office and to R.A.F. Abingdon to attend and send a contingent to the November Remembrance Sunday service. The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 5th October in the Village Hall at 7.00pm. *Brian Forster, Chair, KBS Parish Council.*

Citizens Advice puts pension options in your hands

Q. I've heard that the new pension reforms say I will have full access to my pension pot when I turn 55. How do I work out what I should do with my pension savings?

A. The pension reforms that came in this April give people the freedom to access their defined contribution pension and do whatever they want with it. You can buy an annuity, or take your pension out in one go, or withdraw it bit by bit and leave some of it invested.

Planning for your retirement can be complicated so it's important to get guidance on your options.

The good news is that the Government has introduced Pension Wise, a new free service offering guidance online, over the phone with The Pensions Advisory Service, or face to face with Citizens Advice. Appointments are pre-booked 45-minute sessions tailored to your individual circumstances. Guidance is impartial, meaning that it will not recommend products or services, but the person you talk to will describe your options and help you consider their impact.

To get the most out of Pension Wise guidance, preparation is important. First, work out the value of your pension pots. Look at your most recent statement or contact your provider. Check and see if there are any restrictions attached. Next, get a state pension forecast, and gather the details of any benefits you receive. The next step is to work out your likely expenditure. Include the cost of essentials like housing or utilities, and leisure activities. This should give you a rough budget.

Bring this information to your Pension Wise appointment. Citizens Advice staff will help you think through your circumstances and present the options available to you.





We've got a lunch offer at the moment using cheaper cuts and produce from the grounds. Our most popular dish so far is the pork faggots so here is our recipe. We serve with mustard potatoes and mushy peas.

350g onions, very thinly sliced, 500g liver and heart cut into 4cm pieces, 250g belly, 75g fresh breadcrumbs, pinch of mace, chopped sage, salt and pepper. Caul fat for wrapping (available from good butchers) and 250ml water.

It's a very simple recipe you put the meat and half the onions and water in a casserole dish and cook for around 45 minutes until tender. Put it all through a mincer and then add the remaining ingredients. Mix and form into balls and cover with the caul fat in a ball shape. Reduce down the cooking liquor with the remaining onions to form a sauce consistency. Pour over the balls to reheat in the oven.

SHARING WHAT WE HAVE

I hope it's been a good summer for you. Sadly, for many in the Middle East, it has been terrible, the worst of all worst of times. We see on our screens the biggest refugee crisis since the Second World War. It's touched all our hearts. At St John the Baptist we've been looking at how we can help, do stop by and join the discussion on that, we hope to be taking steps to help the refugees in one way or another.

Harvest is a good moment to share. The God of the Bible has always shown care and compassion for those in need, this is a chance for us to do likewise. Back near the beginning of the Bible, God says to the people of Israel: "When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Leave them for the poor and the alien. I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 23:22). From then on, God repeatedly speaks up for the poor, the alien and the stranger, and commands His people to help them.

This Harvest, we're again asking everyone, individuals and village organizations: please bring some food to church on Harvest Sunday, October 11th, to give to the Oxford Community Emergency Foodbank and Kingsmoor Day Centre. The Community Emergency Foodbank provides food parcels to people at moments of crisis, to tide them through (no one can go to it without being referred by a doctor or social worker or other responsible person). It's shocking how many families in this country face empty shelves and don't have food to give their children. We hope also to be able to help the refugees, come to Harvest and find out more.

As well as helping others, Harvest is a good moment in the year to celebrate, to give thanks to God for all his provision for us. The Bible tells us: "Unless the Lord builds the house, the builders labour in vain. Unless the Lord watches over the city, the watchmen stand guard in vain" (Psalm 127:2) – we all need His help in all we do, whether we are conscious of our need or not. It's good to thank the God who made us for all his good gifts to us.
